# How Do Catholics Understand the Word "Ministry?" PART III:


I have been asked by several parishioners about the academic paper I presented last June at the first session of a five-year series of international ecumenical meetings between the Catholic Church

and the Disciples of Christ Church. Our topic for this phase of dialogue focuses on the role of the Holy Spirit in ministry. My task in this paper was to lay out the parameters of a Catholic understanding of the word "ministry" as well as a Catholic understanding of the ways the Holy Spirit is involved in ministry and those who serve as ministers in the Church. Part III in this series will present a synopsis of the importance and roles of ordained ministers as ordinary ministers in the Church and archetypes of all ministry. You may view the earlier parts of this series by going to the August 2 and 9 bulletins.

Very early in the Church's history it became important to identify permanent roles in the Church's life in response to its pastoral needs and to provide stability over the course of time. Ordination bestows that permanency and stability. During this time, the ordained ministries of bishop, priest, and deacon emerged as a guarantee of the continuation of Christ's ministry on earth. While the ministry of the bishop, priest, and deacon are not exclusive ways of carrying out Christ's ministry, they do serve as the ordinary way to provide at least a minimal guarantee that the essential pastoral functions they undertake in the Church will be stably and permanently provided.

They also serve as a representational expression of how the various ministries of the Church are to function. As we will see, the way a bishop governs is to serve as a reflection of how Christ governs and therefore how all who are given authority to govern in any type of ministry, ordained or not, are to govern. The way a priest sanctifies and teaches is to reflect how Christ sanctifies and teaches and therefore how all who share in the ministry of sanctifying and teaching, ordained or not, are to function. The way a deacon serves as the embodiment of Christ's way of serving is to inspire all in the ministry of service, ordained or not, to do so in the same way.



# **Gathered Around the Piano**


I only met my grandma a few times, before I traveled to Flint, Michigan in 1980 for her funeral. Little did I know how important those days would be in my life. It was in Michigan that I first sat down at a piano. As I was playing around on the keys, my uncle, who was a Lutheran church musician, noticed that his young nephew had an affinity for music. He talked things over with my mom and dad, and within a few weeks, an upright piano was in our living room in Southern California. It was on that piano that I learned to play my first notes, wrote my first songs, and shared many evenings making music with my brothers and sisters. I remember having a jazz "jam session" in honor of my dad on the night of his own funeral, all of us grabbing different instruments, gathered around that piano. In much the same way, the piano has been an important part of our gatherings at St. Francis. From our weekly Eucharistic celebrations, funerals, weddings, and a host of other liturgies, we have praised the God from whom all blessings flow in song, often accompanied by the piano.

While my predecessors and I owe a great deal of gratitude to our current

instrument, it is well beyond its ability to support our prayer now and into the future. After several decades of use, including temperature and humidity changes in the church building, it has extensive damage to many internal parts. We are currently spending several hundred dollars per month simply trying to maintain it. We have chosen to replace the current piano with a Schimel piano. This finely crafted. German instrument is shown in the attached picture. It is a 7-foot grand piano, perfect for the size of our church, and built to withstand environment changes, and maintain tone and tuning. The piano will cost about \$70,000, but will give us many years of support for our prayer in liturgy, the source and summit of our Catholic faith.



# JUSTICE AND PEACE MINISTRIES





I remember as a child the excitement accompanying back to school shopping with my mom. Little me brimmed with joy at getting a new backpack and other supplies—I usually had my sights on everything dinosaurs. I am sure this was an exciting time for my mother as well, as she saw my joy as we weaved the store aisles checking off the supplies list (I am sure at least some of that joy had to do with the prospect of having us kids out of the house for a few more hours each day too).

Unfortunately, this story isn't true for so many children and parents for whom purchasing needed school supplies can be an insurmountable financial burden. But thanks to you and so many others at St. Francis who supported our Back to School Supplies Drive, this burden was lifted for numerous families. Together, we were able to pack over 175 backpacks full of school supplies and donate them to five different organizations. In addition to offering supplies to Our Lady of the Rosary, Passage Home, the Hispanic Family Center, and Inter-Faith Food Shuttle, we had so many supplies that we were able to donate to Welcome NC, an organization supporting refugees here in the US! There are so many ways in which we find ourselves increasingly polarized – left versus right, neighbor against neighbor. It can be especially hard, though, when we encounter these divisions within our own family. When our strong political views differ from those closest to us, we simply can't wish away the problem and hope it will go away. Talking about the weather doesn't get us very far; the hurt and the wariness hover over us and drag us down.

Are you looking for more effective ways to address political differences with those you love? If so, please consider joining fellow parishioners and friends on Thursday, Sep 15, 2022, 7-9:15pm, Founders

Room in Anthony Hall for <u>"Families and Politics"</u>, a workshop designed to help participants learn strategies and practice skills for addressing polarization within families. Register at <u>bit.ly/depolarizeSFA2022a</u>. Expect an invitation to complete a short online mini-course to prepare for the workshop, then join us for a surprisingly light, fun evening of exercises and role-playing. Don't be surprised if you walk away with lessons that will serve you well even in conversations with those outside your family.

Skilled, experienced moderators from Braver Angels will lead this, our second parish workshop on depolarization. Braver Angels, a national organization with a strong presence in the Triangle area and across North Carolina, exists to promote respect, civility, empathy, and goodwill in our interactions with those with whom we disagree politically.

You needn't worry about meetings or commitments; the allies group is nothing more than an email list that allows you to your finger on the pulse.

Have you wondered how interrupted learning during the pandemic affected school-age children?



It left a significant impact on their reading skills, according to the Wake County School System, and you can help students recover from this academic toll by volunteering as a tutor. By volunteering a short amount of your time, you could not only improve the remainder of a child's educational path, but also his or her entire life.

The school system has partnered with local agencies in an effort called Wake Together to help students in grades two through five improve their reading and advance their learning future.

The Education Issue Team at St. Francis of Assisi recommends volunteering for this program if you are seeking a way to help young students. The Education Is-

sue Team is part of the Office of Justice and Peace and operates on the premise that the right to a basic education is an integral part in the development of the dignity of the human person as outlined in Catholic Social Teaching.

Reading skills are integral because they affect children's abilities to learn in all the subject areas—math, science, history, music, and art.

# What is required of a volunteer?

 Volunteers are needed during the school day, after school, or evenings at elementary schools or community sites.

- All volunteers will be screened, complete a background check, and participate in 3-4 hours of training prior to being paired with students.
- To provide consistency for students as well as fidelity to the implementation of the tutoring program, volunteers should be able to commit to 1-2 hours per week for at least a semester.

# The Burning Bush

Flood waters swallow, intense droughts continue, and wildfires consume, and yet we find ourselves unable or unwilling to aggressively address the issues that affect our common home. Every year, churches across the world come together for the "Season of Creation," from September 1st through October 4th, to raise our awareness, prayer, and action to address these issues and more related to a changing climate and our neglect of God's creation.

Pope Francis wrote in his 2015 teaching document called Laudato Si' that our earth is like our sister, "This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse . . . the earth herself . . . is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; . . . We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air, and we receive life and refreshment from her waters."

This year's Season of Creation theme is "Listen to the Voice of Creation."
There is a long-standing view within the Judeo-Christian tradition that God speaks to us through creation, that crea-

tures speak to us of the Creator's goodness, truth, and beauty. With this theme, we are invited to ask ourselves: To what are we listening? Where does God speak to us in creation? Can we stop and listen deeply to the cry of the poor and the cry of the earth? What is distracting us?
