GOING, GOING, GONE: THE GREAT DEPARTURE FROM CATHOLICISM, PART VII:

Departures from Catholicism in the U.S. are outpacing arrivals at an estimated 6-to-1 ratio. How do we stop the bleed, especially with regard to our youth and young adults? This is the seventh in a multi-part series describing some of the major factors contributing to this phenomenon, and what are some positive steps we as a community of faith can take to remediate this departure. This week I will present some ways we at St. Francis are having a positive impact on our youth and young adults and attracting growth in general.

We live in a secular world. Some believe that the best way to deal with that world and retain/grow in faith is to inoculate ourselves against the secular world, even withdraw from it. Historically there have always been groups who have chosen that route. History also shows us that the vast majority of people have tried to figure out how to live in a secular world (think about the time of Jesus and the early Church, which existed in a very secular environment). Some churches today, both Catholic and Protestant, are pursuing the inoculate/withdrawal approach. At St. Francis, we have elected to figure out how to live in the secular world. We do not believe the major struggle is between belief and secularism. We believe the major struggle is between cynicism and hope. This is why the environment we have created and are trying to develop takes a more a positivistic approach.

The adults of our community, especially parents, are invited to a collaborative venture with us to approach our faith and how to live it out based on principles that post-moderns, especially our children, youth, and emerging adults find attractive. What does that look like? Ronald Rolheiser, a well-known priest, described this vision based on a conference he was a part of on secularity and faith. I find his insights compelling and highlight some of them now because they capture so well what we at St. Francis are doing.

He says that a vision, attitude, behavior, and language that speaks to post-moderns has at least seven components:

- 1) radically simple without being simplistic;
- 2) deeply personal yet profoundly universal;
- 3) clearly committed yet never hard, judgmental, exclusive, or doctrinaire;







All In the Family

When Marie Leone first toured The Franciscan School, she knew it was the place for her. What she didn't know was that eventually, each of her family members would join her at the school.

Marie retired from TFS four years ago after 19 years of service. Marie watched the school grow from 300 students to 700 students, and she had the opportunity to work with each principal until her retirement. During her first three vears at the school, she served as a teacher's assistant. She also started the before-school program, where she got to spend time with and love on students outside of her own classroom. For the full 19 years of her time at TFS, Marie led this program each day. And as the school continued to grow, Father Mark Reamer asked Marie if she would become the "face of TFS." This meant serving as a permanent receptionist and administrative assistant. After just the first few months in the position, Marie knew this was the position for her. "Becoming the receptionist was something I felt became my calling," says Marie. "I knew I wanted to be there for students and families, guiding them and helping them with whatever they needed."

In addition to being the receptionist and leading the before-school program, Marie was a Eucharistic minister at 5:30pm Mass on Saturdays and for every school Mass. Marie gave school tours, handled and distributed all the books and supply orders, answered questions from families, and helped the teachers with various tasks. Pretty much anything on campus, Marie was a part of. When she gave tours. Marie would tell families "If you feel something special, know you are being drawn here. If you aren't sure, come back. And if you feel that warmth, this is where you belong."



One of the factors that led Marie to the school was that her second-oldest daughter, Cristina Leone Gautier, was hired the year before the school completed its build. This is where Cristina started her 23-year teaching career. She first began teaching 2nd grade for four years, then moved to Kindergarten where she taught for 13 years. She currently teaches 3rd grade where she has been for the last six years. Cristina has been the team lead in Kindergarten, second grade and third grade. She was the student council advisor for about 13 years, a faculty liaison for the PAC committee and the HSA committee, and she has served on several curriculum committees, to name a few of the things that keep her busy.

Screen Shot 2022-11-28 at 1.48.58 PM For Cristina, she says, "The proof of how wonderful a school TFS is points to all the alumni who come back after graduating from college to be teachers here." "TFS is such a special place," she adds. "You can feel it as soon as you step on campus, and in the courtyard during Morning Prayer. There is nothing like it."

This infectious enthusiasm from Marie and Cristina pulled in more of their family. Frances Leone Willard, Marie's youngest daughter, joined TFS in 2003 and taught for 11 years. She began as a teacher's assistant for a year, taught Kindergarten for a year, and eventually became the K-8 Art teacher for the next nine years where she taught the children pottery. Frances majored in Art and was thrilled to have the opportunity to teach her passion with the students.

During that time, Marie's son, Joseph (Joe), then a high school student, spent his afternoons starting the TFS after-school Bridges program along with Frances. After several years spent working in the commercial and residential electrical field. Joe was hired to work at

TFS and the parish. His motivation was that, "Watching my siblings and mother work in a place with such a deep sense of community and family made me want to do something to help keep that going with my own time and talent." For the last 15 years of his service at the school, Joe has primarily served as the Maintenance Technician and Facilities Manager, the position he currently holds. He gets to interact with the community very closely on a daily basis and ensures a safe, welcoming, and well-functioning environment.

Joe also has a passion for coaching youth sports and was given the opportunity to serve as an assistant coach to the TFS varsity girls soccer team in 2021-2022. He shares, "There's nothing quite like seeing the students throughout the day when I'm doing my various jobs and hearing 'Hey, Coach Joe!'" Because of his roles, Joe got an "inside" look at the school, which sealed his desire to raise his two daughters at TFS. "I always knew I would want to raise my own family in the St. Francis community and entrust TFS with my children's education when the time came. I wanted to be confident that the educational environment would

mimic our beliefs and continue instilling good values in my children when they were learning during the day." While his oldest daughter is now in high school, his youngest daughter is still at the school as a 6-year-old.

Screen Shot 2022-11-28 at 1.49.05 PM And not to leave a family member out, Marie's oldest daughter, Michelle Leone Cash, was the personal chef for the St. Francis friars on and off for 19 years. She graduated from The Culinary Institute of America as a Certified Chef. and she would also do all the school and church catering. A few of the events she helped with were: organizing and serving snacks for the children that attended vacation Bible classes during the summer; cooking and serving meals to the middle school and high school students who attended faith formation classes; organizing the food trucks for the Francis Fest; and working at the church's community center.

At one point, all of Marie's four children were working at the St. Francis or TFS campus! When her husband retired, he also came to the church to run the community center cafe on Fridays after Mass. What's most exciting about this

family's story is that it all began with Marie's parents (her children's grandparents) who first discovered TFS after moving from New York. They were involved at St. Francis, and they first encouraged Cristina to apply as a teacher. From there, each member of the Leone family saw the school and parish through their eyes. "Seeing the way being part of the parish enriched my grandparents' lives gave me a strong desire to give back to the church using the talents with which God blessed me," says Joe.

It's clear to see that the entire Leone family has been captivated by the love at TFS and the church. They all embody a quote that former TFS principal Barbara Polston used to share during morning prayer: "Work hard, play hard, but most of all be kind to one another."

Baffle Anyone?

Afterall, preschoolers generally are familiar with how excited their families are when they bring home something special that they have made.

Anticipation

The 1st week of Advent, (the 1st purple candle), symbolizes hope. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. The candle represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.

How did your 1st week of Advent go? If you are anything like me, getting started with Advent can be difficult, as it requires a mindset change, from being passive (waiting) to being active (to make ready) and anticipating. (expect) The 2nd week of Advent, (the 2nd purple candle), symbolizes faith. During this week, we are longing, preparing and anticipating the arrival, the birthday, of the Prince of Peace.

In anticipating the Prince of Peace and the 2nd purple candle, I leave you with Isiah 11: 1-10 below. I agree with the reflection that Fr. Alex gave earlier this week on this reading at Daily Mass, this is why I'm both excited about Advent and going to heaven.

Pax et Bonum Chris



On that day, A shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him: a Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, A Spirit of counsel and of strength, a Spirit of knowledge and of fear of the LORD, and his delight shall be the fear of the LORD. Not by appearance shall he judge, nor by hearsay shall he decide, But he shall judge the poor with justice. and decide aright for the land's afflicted. He shall strike the ruthless with the rod of his mouth. and with the breath of his lips he shall slav the wicked. Justice shall be the band around his waist, and faithfulness a belt upon his hips. Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; The calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them. The cow and the bear shall be neighbors, together their young shall rest: the lion shall eat hay like the ox. The baby shall play by the cobra's den, and the child lay his hand on the adder's lair. 

Sister Helen Prejean, author of Dead Man Walking, once wrote, "If we believe that murder is wrong and not admissible in our society, then it has to be wrong for everyone, not just individuals but governments as well." Dignity and the Death Penalty: Evolution of Catholic Teaching (Alice Hugh Brown, author) is a 2021 publication based on decades of experience and insights from Sister Helen. This slim volume, heralded by the Catholic Mobilizing Network, is an excellent means of bringing to light the evolution of Church teaching and to illuminate Pope Francis's 2018 statement, "The death penalty is inadmissible, and Catholics should work for its abolition."

Society of St. Vincent de Paul

In today's Gospel, John the Baptist urges us to "Prepare the way of the Lord." This is what Advent is all about, for we are called to help prepare the way of the Lord by making the real meaning of Christmas come alive in our own hearts, in our family and to reach out to those in need.

St. Vincent de Paul Society at St. Francis of Assisi works with families who need assistance. The neighbors are the working poor—people who have gotten behind in rent or utility payments because of a layoff, illness, death in the family or an unexpected emergency.

On neighbor got behind in rent when a babysitter problem caused her to leave work to find her three children ages 9, 7 and 4. The babysitter had left the children with someone but was unclear about their whereabouts.

One problem turned into another as the neighbor lost her job because she was unable to find a replacement babysitter. One of her children has heart problems, and she could not find a daycare willing to take her.

Although her job and babysitting situations have improved, she was going to be evicted because of the back rent she owed. This mother has worked since she was 14 years old helping her mother support the family.

Financial help from her mom, the Friendship Fund at First Presbyterian Church, SVdP and some of the neighbor's new income helped her avoid eviction.

Is there a neighbor or friend of yours who is in temporary need because of a loss of a job or an illness? Please leave a message for the Society of St. Vincent de Paul at 919-534-484...we want to help!

In addition to providing financial assistance, SVdP members have a large catalog of resource agencies that can help neighbors, such as Legal Aid.

SVdP meets biweekly to discuss and act on how it will assist neighbors.

- 4) contemporary without being full of cliché, fad, or hype;
- 5) invitational yet respecting freedom and not proselytizing;
- 6) radiating the joy of the resurrection as it leads us deeper into the fuller mystery of Jesus' passion and death; and
- 7) sensitive to human weakness even as it challenges that weakness and invites us to something better (*Secularity and the Gospel*, 25-26).

The Franciscans who led us for 33 years helped us to develop this vision, attitude, behavior, and language. They called our community to reflect the life of St. Francis, simple and deeply grounded in the Gospel, and to a commitment to inclusion and justice that is never hard, judgmental, or exclusive. We take a contemporary approach to being church, one example among many being our approach to worship, another our emphasis on the role of the laity to live our their priestly, prophetic, and royal offices received in their baptism. We welcome everyone and do our best to radiate the joy of our faith in a positive manner.

As diocesan clergy, we have embraced this worldview and are exploring ways to build upon it. One of those areas is evangelization, awakening those who are part of our community to the invitation from the Lord to a personal relationship that goes beyond what religious instruction generally offers. We are building on a resurrection vision that also acknowledges our ongoing need to embrace the Lord's suffering and death, both redemptive for the world and for us. We remain committed to our community's embrace of Catholic Social Teaching and the outstanding pastoral care we extend to both those within our community and those beyond our walls.

This call extends to the households of our faith community. Look at these seven points and see how you are living them out in your home with those who live with you. Our younger members live in a world filled with cynicism, even despair. We offer hope, encouragement, and relationships that build up rather than tear down. If we can do this in our faith community and our homes, we stand a better chance of attracting and keeping people of all ages closer to the Church.


