

BISHOP LUÍS IS COMING TO ST. FRANCIS:

On Sunday, January 15, Bishop Luís will be with us for a few hours. He will be the principal celebrant at the 9:00am Mass. Following the Mass, he will dedicate the newest addition to our columbarium and bless our new Franciscan Garden.

Afterward, he will gather with us in Fellowship Hall for a reception. We would love to see a full house at the 9:00am Mass and a good showing of parishioners for the dedication/blessing and reception.

COLOMBARIUM QUESTION: CREMATION AND CATHOLICS:

Catholics are increasingly choosing to be cremated. This has been particularly true since the onset of the pandemic. In 1997, the Catholic Church in the United States, with the approval of the Vatican, published guidelines to assist parishes and the families of those who are cremated in the proper and reverent treatment of these cremains (the word we use to describe the cremated remains of someone after cremation) as is befitting their human dignity. Since 1996 we have been blessed to have a columbarium and memorial garden as part of our community's life, one of the earliest columbariums located at a Catholic Church in the United States. Next Sunday we will see the first expansion of it with an additional 616 niches.

As we see cremation increase in frequency, it seems apropos to provide a bit of catechesis on cremation. In our country, there are various practices regarding the treatment of cremains. Some of them are influenced by the secular world, other Christian traditions, or other faiths that do not view the human body in the same way as the Catholic Church does. This has led to some confusion or lack of awareness about how a Catholic who is cremated should be treated. Here are a few comments from our official text, *The Order of Christian Funerals* (OCF), as guidance and education.

The Order of Christian Funerals says the following: "The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they come. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the cremains, the manner in which they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave, entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium, or buried at the sea intact just as a body would be laid to rest in a cemetery. The practices of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or a friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires" (OCF§417). This is our official Church teaching on this matter.

When possible and feasible, it is recommended that the cremation take place after the Funeral liturgy at which the body is present (OCF§418). This is because the body is of great importance in the Catholic faith since it served as a temple of the Holy Spirit and was once washed in baptism, anointed with the oil of salvation, and fed with the Bread of Life (OCF§412). Increasingly, the costs associate with funerals and other factors makes this recommendation impractical. Note that this is a recommendation, not a requirement.

The decision for cremation can be challenging. Please know we are here to assist you with your questions and discernment about the reverent treatment of your loved ones and you should cremation be an option you are considering.




Want to Pray and March for Life, Justice, and Peace in January?

New Middle School Advisory Program



Middle school can sometimes be hard to navigate. With a change in how classes are arranged, the academic rigor that can be found, developments personally and socially, and new expectations and responsibilities set on students, it's important that they are supported well in order to thrive and flourish. New this year, The Franciscan School has launched its first-ever Middle School Advisory Program. The program aims to equip students with academic, social, and emotional life skills that foster individual well-being and promote a healthy, faith-based community connection.

"As the Principal at TFS," says Dawn Smith, "my role is to support new initiatives and help provide the time, space, and resources to introduce new programs that will strengthen our focus of faith, academics, and service." The Middle School Advisory Program was created from a vision that Smith and Assistant Principal Colette Dziadul had for TFS's middle school students as they both previously worked in schools with advisory programs. Smith was instrumental in building the advisory program at her former middle school twenty years ago. During that time, she served as an advisor for sixth grade students and continues to have relationships with some of her previous students to this day.

The middle school experience at TFS has been intentionally crafted to ensure that the students are surrounded by excellent academics, caring faculty, instruction in God's word and programs (such as Advisory), all that focus on educating the whole child. Dziadul's experience with a previous school's advisory program has helped her understand the importance of this program at TFS. "The Middle School Advisory Program plays a critical role in fostering the development of the whole child," shared Dziadul. "Advisory engages our students in meaningful and relevant activities designed to develop valuable life skills of teamwork, communication, empathy, and citizenship." Through a variety of lessons and activities within the program, faculty will empower students with life-enhancing themes that will address developmentally-appropriate needs and concerns. Advisory time also allows students to foster relationships with faculty and peers, providing an opportunity to grow together.

Jari Pathenos, middle school teacher and mentor in the advisory program, believes the program is "essential as a supplement to academic studies as we focus on the social emotional well-being of ourselves and others. Kids need to learn how to handle difficult situations and how to problem-solve difficult tasks." Pathenos mentors a small group of 6th

grade students and provides a safe environment for them to express feelings, struggles, hopes, successes, and fears. "Sixth grade is a transition year, and we have focused on social and emotional changes that the kids are experiencing," explains Pathenos. "I am sharing tools and authentic examples to help guide kids to self-advocate, to learn from setbacks, to keep pushing forward with a growth mindset, and to basically take the lead in their own life."

Melissa Walsh, also a middle school teacher at TFS, is an advisory teacher with Rachel Espinoza, the school's 3rd-8th grade Art teacher. "It's nice for the middle schoolers to feel like they have a home base and a go-to teacher to ask questions," says Walsh. "It also allows us to hold middle school-wide enrichment activities such as performances and guest speakers without disrupting our schedules, which we've never had the opportunity to do before." Walsh enjoys working with Espinoza to help make the transition to middle school a little easier for students while also providing the academic support they need.

During the program, students will be engaged in topics such as Digital Citizenship, Service Learning, Fostering a

Respectful Community, Leadership, Self-Advocacy, Growth Mindset, Life Balance, and Personal Choice. Smith shares that even in the first semester of the program's launch, they've received positive feedback from students. Two eighth grade students, Max Tenace and Indi Mareno, shared their sentiments: "Each week we have a new lesson that helps us live and learn as Jesus did," says Tenace. And Mareno shares that "This time is for good team building and learning leadership skills. I wish this had been in place since my sixth grade year."

Advisory Program Growth Mindset

As Principal, Smith is committed to continuing this program and helping it grow and develop each semester. "This program is needed because middle school is an exciting and yet complex time for our students as so much is expected of them. A complete education encompasses not only academic discipline, but also expanded awareness of self, social interactions, and the world. A designated advisory time allows teachers to connect with a group of students to provide academic and social-emotional support and to strengthen the community of the school."

We are excited to watch this program grow and our students flourish as they take new steps into middle school and eventually on to high school.

It's the first bulletin of January in 2023 which means... Happy New Year to all of you.

A few bulletins ago ([see Striving for a Better Grade? /12-18-2022](#)) I spoke about the importance of helping our children get closer to God and resolutions in the new year.

Now that we are a week or so into January, how are you doing with your resolutions? A study online, found that almost two-thirds of people abandoned their New Year's resolutions within the 1st month. How many resolutions have you broken? How many have you kept?


Do any of your resolutions include helping your children get closer to God? As parents, we may think that living out our baptismal vows for our kids includes taking them to church on a weekly basis, enrolling them at our Catholic schools and/or having them attend faith formation. This is good, but is this enough? This is a tough question, one I've grappled with myself.

How are we modeling our baptismal call for our kids? How often do we talk to them about God? How often do we pray with them? Read books? Scripture? Show them living examples of Christ? Do we engage our children in Christ-centered conversation - even about the little things?

Knowing that so many of our young people are leaving the church (some before they are 18), what role do we play? As parents, are we raising fans of Jesus Christ or are we raising disciples of Jesus Christ? - a tough question indeed. Are we convenient cheerleaders or models of the faith we proclaim?

I've broken many resolutions and struggle as a parent myself, but it's never too late. Let's renew our resolution to be better Christ-centered models for our children even with the little things, which have a funny way of turning out to be the big things, and sometimes the most important things of all.
