THE COMPLEXITIES OF FORGIVENESS:

Lent is a season that invites Christians to renew, re-center, and/or reawaken ourselves around the significance of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection (also referred to as the Paschal Mystery) for us and the whole world. It leads to the short season known as the Triduum (the Three Days) when we will celebrate

the Paschal Mystery in the fullest way possible with the liturgies Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday.

It is a season when opportunities will increase for Catholics to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation through parish Penance Services. There will be 15 of these services in our deanery alone (Wake and Franklin Counties). As you know, this is one of the four sacraments of forgiveness in the Catholic tradition (Baptism, Eucharist, and Anointing of the Sick are the other three) and the forgiveness of sins is a feature of the Lenten season.

Forgiveness is a very complex process. I thought it would be good to present a series on forgiveness in this column during the Lenten season so we might have a better appreciation and experience of forgiveness both for ourselves and others during Lent and beyond. I will explore four essentials: what forgiveness is and is not, what makes it difficult, why it is so important, and what strategies can help us to forgive in a healthy and holy way.

The social sciences view forgiveness this way: a conscious, deliberate decision to release feelings of resentment or vengeance toward a person or group who has harmed you, regardless of whether they actually deserve your forgiveness. The Christian faith views it this way: the act of pardoning an offender. In the Christian Testament, the Greek word translated into English as "forgiveness" literally means "to let go," as when a person does not demand payment for a debt. As we can see, there's much in common with both descriptions. And as all of us know, forgiveness is easier said than done. I'll discuss the challenges to forgive in the second part of this series but I think these definitions give us a good base for describing what forgiveness is.

There can be misunderstandings about forgiveness that will benefit from being brought to light. Here are some of the common ones I have encountered over my four decades of priesthood: 1) includes forgetting the unkind, hurtful, or selfish behavior of another, 2) always should result in reconciliation, 3) is something you

Greener Lent is a Lenten program that prepares our hearts for Easter through prayer, fasting and almsgiving through the lens of *Laudato Si* (Pope Francis's encyclical on caring for our common home and the poor). In addition to the Church's prescribed days of fast and abstinence, Greener Lent participants increase the rigor of their fast by reducing their consumption of meat, especially beef and lamb, substituting food with significantly lower environmental impact. Participants are encouraged to formally commit to prayer for the conversion of hearts, donate to Catholic Relief Services, and pray for those whose livelihoods have been hurt or destroyed by the climate crisis. Each week Greener Lent participants will receive an email message indicating an estimate of the carbon equivalents saved by our parish and how much has been donated to the CRS/Greener Lent fund. At this Lenten Service Sunday, we will work together to trace, cut, and organize denim shoe kits for vulnerable children in Uganda in partnership with Sole Hope.




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should automatically do because you are a Christian, and 4) never has to include justice or responsibility on the part of the offender. A few words about each.

Some people mistakenly believe that we should be able to forget harmful behavior once we forgive (e.g., "Get over it!"). While there are some cases where this happens, harmful behavior leaves a footprint on our hearts, minds, souls, and sometimes our bodies. We remember pain as a survival instinct. Forgetting the hurt we experience is a fairly extraordinary occurrence, not normative. Some people mistakenly think that forgiveness should result in reconciliation. These are two distinct processes and sometimes circumstances are such that repeated suffering from an offender makes reconciliation not only impossible but also foolhardy.

Some people mistakenly think that if someone offends them they should automatically forgive the offender because it's the "Christian" thing to do. Authentic forgiveness is rarely automatic and for it to have lasting effects requires several steps. Finally, some people conclude that forgiveness does not have consequences like restoration, compensation, or at least an apology. Nothing could be further from the truth.





Sharing the Good News of the Lord and Our Community: An Updated Approach

This is the second part of a four part series about a recent effort to improve our communication processes (bulletin, website, social media) while not losing sight of meeting the needs of our community. If you missed the first part, please click here.

Evangelization was named as a high parish priority by parishioners who participated in the Fall 2019 Parish Leadership Summit and remains so by Fr. Michael. Our website, social media presence, and our bulletin all play a role in sharing the Good News of the Lord and, hopefully, attracting more people to the Lord and our community of faith. Key to this goal, according to Pope Francis, is seeing communications not simply as an exchange of information but, first and foremost, a sharing in our humanity. It is fundamentally about establishing relationships and not just simply sharing facts and information. This priority and the Holy Father's insight have motivated us to review our various communication platforms.

In late 2022, we contracted with Creative Will Consulting, a parishioner owned company, to assist us in rethinking and reshaping our digital presence. In this work, we looked at how people (of all ages) are consuming information and where they are going to consume it. Some of the data that we found through this process was not only eye opening but it also helped shape our content and design strategy for the redesigned website and social media platforms. Here are a few points that you may find interesting:

- 82% of the public uses some type of social media
- On average, Americans tend to spend less than 4 seconds on any piece of content on a social media platform and about 52 seconds on a website page
- When asked which of these platforms adults prefer to get news on, about half of Americans say they prefer a digital device (53%), more than say they prefer TV (33%). Even fewer Americans prefer radio (7%) or print (5%)

After months of development work, our new website was launched to create windows of opportunity for evangelization and relationship building. Our two social media accounts, Facebook and Instagram, share the same goal while using pictures and videos. Our hope is that our revised platforms will be more appealing to our parishioners and that they will now be able to more easily stay connected and informed on the faith and life of our community.

Next week, we will look at how the website, social media platforms, and the bulletin will work together towards a new communication strategy in our pursuit of sharing the good news of Jesus Christ.

February Cross Step (Pre-K Faith Formation) at a Glance:



For the month of February, the Cross Step children have delved deeply into the Beatitudes, which are the sayings of Jesus and the eight blessings recounted by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount. The word "beatitudes" has two parts to it: "be" and "attitude," so the children were taught that the Beatitudes are ways that we can be and attitudes that we can have. We emphasized the importance of being kind to others by playing several classroom games, and we also read Jill Kemp's "Golden Rules to Live By" picture book. Afterwards, the children finger painted bumble bees onto pictures of beehives since our entire lesson was about the BEE-ATTITUDES. It was pretty funny stuff!

In addition to learning about the Golden Rule, during the following week, we talked about how Jesus said that we need to be the salt and light of the Earth. The children were shown pictures of their favorite salty snacks, and they were educated that the reason why these foods taste so delicious is because they are

seasoned with salt. Without salt, these foods would not be as nearly delectable tasting. Being the "salt of the Earth" is a similar concept, where we are not good as Christians by ourselves, but with the help of Jesus. He makes our lives richer and more meaningful. Jesus also emphasized that he wants us all to be light. Using flashlights and blankets, we showed the children how we cannot see when we are immersed in total darkness. but we can see when there is light. Just like light needs to be seen, we [Catholics] also need to live so that everyone can see the light of Christ in us. Part of how we can shine our light is to emulate the way that Angels and Saints behaved.

To conclude the month of February, the children learned about Jesus' Law of Love, or this idea that we should love one another. We discussed how people need rules to follow, such as the Ten Commandments or even classroom rules, but it is not enough to just blindly follow directions; our actions should be guided from love rather than restraint. We further

emphasized how the Catholic Church has a Holy Book called the Bible, which teaches us how to behave and live in a way that is Christ-like. God loves everyone, and His magnanimous, unending, and unconditional love was reflected in His son, Jesus, who embraced the most downtrodden and socially outcast members of society, so we should strive to love and treat others the way Jesus did. Afterwards, the children colored "Love Your Neighbor as Yourself" paper plates. which contained hearts with the names and drawings of important loved ones in the children's lives. It was a super sweet memento that the Cross Step kiddos took home, just in time for Valentine's Day.

Subscribers share the risks of the farming and the rewards of receiving a weekly box of sustainably and organically grown produce for 8 weeks during the Spring season.

Please consider joining me in subscribing to this effort, to provide fresh, healthy produce to our families while supporting farmers of color, caring for Earth, our common home, and taking a step to add more justice to our food system.

The deadline to sign up is March 31st. The first week of delivery will be April 22nd. You will receive a box of fresh, delicious produce, every Saturday, for 8 weeks. The price of a full share is \$250, a half share is \$125. You will need to come to St. Francis on Saturday mornings (9am - 10am) to pick up your produce.

Honoring our Black Catholic History

Sister Thea Bowman was born in Mississippi in 1937. She grew up in the midst of racism, segregation, and inequality. Her deep love for her African-American culture and spirituality contributed to her life's mission and work.

Inspired by the love and care she experienced from her Catholic teachers, she became Catholic at age 9. She later joined the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration where she was the only African-American in the Community. Sister Thea, empowered by her culture's rich traditions and spirituality, lived a life on fire with love for Christ. She was a teacher, preacher, lover of the Eucharist and the poor, and imitator of St. Francis. She died on March 30th, 1990.

Thea Hall is named in honor of Sister Thea, highlighting her remarkable vocation as a teacher.

The St. Vincent de Paul Society at St. Francis of Assisi

Today the Gospel shows us how Jesus overcame the temptations of pride, power and prestige. He wanted to serve God and save people. He showed us how to humbly serve God and our neighbor.

Visitors from the St. Vincent de Paul Society tirelessly work on the parish's behalf to serve our neighbors in need. Visitors provide a listening ear as they gather the information needed to provide short-term help for families in the area. Most of the cases involve the working poor who can pay their bills until they get an unexpected situation—a funeral out of town, a car needing service, an extended sickness. Then they need help in making their rent and/or utility payments that month.

Often SVdP will team with another local church or agency to help a neighbor meet expenses. The assistance helps the neighbor get back on the road to a sustainable budget.

Some recent cases include:

- A senior citizen who fell and broke five ribs and was unable to work and requested help with her electric bill.
- A single mom of two daughters with autism. Her husband left two years ago. Although she and the older daughter work long hours, they fell behind in rent when they had to purchase a car to replace a broken-down vehicle. By partnering with Doorway to Hope and Crosspoint Church, SVdP was able to help the family catch up on its expenses.
- A mother who was temporarily unemployed after surgery and needed help with rent and a past due electric bill.

SVdP also voted to donate to a new SVdP conference operating at St. Ann's Catholic Church in Edenton which is pastored by Fr. Jairo, Maldanado-Pacheco, who previously served at St. Francis of Assisi. Join us for A Listening Session with Community Partner ONE Wake

We are a founding congregation of a non-partisan, multi-racial, multi-issue community organizing effort in Wake County called ONE Wake. This organization has brought together 46 faith congregations and non-profits in Wake County to work together on addressing some of the most pressing needs of vulnerable people in our communities. In 2020, ONE Wake publicly launched and since then has been working diligently around 3 issues: affordable housing, education, and employment/wages.

Over the last 3 years, ONE Wake members, including St. Francis parishioners, have met with elected officials, attended press conferences, stood in solidarity with Latino neighbors, advocated for new affordable housing initiatives, organized residents in rapidly gentrifying areas, canvassed for non-partisan local elections...This is good work and it's God's Work!

Over the next couple months, ONE Wake is inviting participating faith congregations and community groups to undertake a series of listening sessions to evaluate the current challenges facing families in our communities. This will set the agenda of ONE Wake for the next few years. This feels very much like the global synodal process of the Catholic Church. Speaking our concerns and engaging in deep listening are important ways the Spirit moves us to discern and take loving action.

Youth Basketball Skills Clinic


