Words of Remembrance

(optional)

* The Words of Remembrance are spoken after communion, just before the final blessing.

One member of the family, or a representative of the family, may offer words of remembrance during the funeral liturgy. The Words of Remembrance will be shared near the end of the service, just before the final blessing.

If this option is chosen, the words that will be spoken must be typed and given to the presider at least 24 hours prior to the funeral liturgy (maximum length: one page, single spaced, 500 words). Outlines only will NOT be considered. The presider will have the option to make edits.

There are three parts to the Words of Remembrance.

- 1. First, it is fitting that you thank people for coming to join you and your family in the celebration of your loved one's life.
- 2. Next, you will want to offer a story or anecdote about your loved one. This is often a difficult challenge. The words of remembrance are not meant to be a eulogy, nor an attempt to capture an individual's entire life, but rather a glimpse into what was particularly meaningful about the love and friendship your loved one offered.
- 3. And finally, conclude by thanking those present for having joined in prayer and song as we continue to remember and celebrate the life of your loved one and our faith in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Of course, one cannot talk about my dad without thinking of my mom at his side. They really did everything together from the time they were high school sweethearts. Mom and Dad spent months together traveling and spending time with their grandchildren. Mostly, they treasured the everyday quiet times, with Mom at Dad's every beck and call, refilling his iced tea, while he doted on her in his own way. I know that no one will miss him more than my mom, because, as Dad would say, "Mom, you're the best."
