On Saturday, October 17, the last group of teens in the parish were confirmed by Fr. Jairo and me. It took four separate Masses to accomplish this in a COVID-19 world with required safety and social distancing protocols, but we are proud of our youth for reaching this milestone in their lives and for the support of their parents and sponsors in helping these teens get across this new

threshold in their lives as fully-initiated Catholics. Thanks to all who helped with their preparation and our four celebrations. We couldn't have done it without you!

Today I am installed as the sixth pastor of St. Francis of Assisi. Bishop Zarama will officiate for this ceremony at the 9:30am livestream Mass. This brief ritual formally makes me your pastor and places the pastoral and canonical responsibilities of pastor officially on my shoulders. I am grateful for your continued prayers.

We restarted a regular time each Saturday afternoon for the Sacrament of Reconciliation (i.e., Confession) in the church. The time will be 4:00-4:45pm. Initially Fr. Jairo and I will both be available and will be located in the last pew on the left and right transepts of the church. No sign-up is required but we will continue to require all safety protocols be followed (e.g., facemask, temperature check prior to entering the church, hands sanitized, social distancing between the penitent and the priest). This is another small step we are taking to open the parish to you. You may also arrange a time for this sacrament by calling the office if Saturday afternoon doesn't work for your schedule.

Last Tuesday, 151 St. Francis parishioners participated in the public launch of One-Wake, an interreligious coalition of churches, synagogues, and mosques to improve conditions in our county in terms of affordable housing, jobs, and education for those whose voices are often not heard in the decisions that are made about these issues. We had the third largest congregational presence at this meeting in which over 2500 people participated virtually. I am very proud of the work Trevor Thompson and our many parishioners have done for a few years to help establish this group.

## Communities of Calling Initiative: **Baptismal Call and Disciples**

On June 1, 2018 our parishioner Larry Petrovick sent an email to Trevor Thompson sharing information about an opportunity to participate in a program called: Communities of Calling Initiative (CCI). The CCI program was an invitation to congregations from across the United States to apply for, and, if accepted, participate in a five-year project that would render formational and profound experiences with regard to God's Baptismal Call or enhance existing ministries to help Christians discover and deepen their sense of God's calling in their lives. The Collegeville Institute would serve as the hub for the work and the Lilly Foundation provided the funding. Our director

of Stewardship completed the grant application and interview process for this opportunity and we were informed in early August, 2018 that St. Francis had been selected as one of the 14 partner congregations from across the country who would be participating.

Each congregation was awarded \$30,000 to be used over the course of those five years. St. Francis was one of two Catholic parishes that were selected as a part of this initiative and we became a part of congregations throughout the country who gathered to learn from each other throughout this 5-year program. The first year was spent preparing for




that's quickly squashed by the memory of the loss.

## **Respect Life: Racism is a life Issue**

There is a very touching scene in the movie Selma, a movie about Dr. Martin Luther King's historic movement to secure voting rights for all people of color in 1965. In it Dr. King is trying to find the words to comfort a grieving grandfather who has just witnessed the confrontation with police and subsequent murder of his only grandson during a peaceful protest. You watch as Dr. King struggles to find words to meet the depth of the grandfather's pain. He searches for something to say, anything to say worthy of such profound heartache. Eventually he finds the words: "God was the first to cry."

The Catholic Church proclaims that every human life is created in the image of God and redeemed by Jesus Christ and therefore is invaluable. Every person, our church teaches, from the moment of conception to natural death has inherent dignity and a right to life consistent with that dignity. Human dignity comes from God, not from any human quality or accomplishment. The church has proclaimed for a long time that in our society, human life is under direct attack for example from abortion, the death penalty, and war.

And so profound is the problem of racism in our country that in November 2018, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (US-CCB) the teaching office of the Vatican here in the US, published a new pastoral letter against racism entitled *Open Wide Our Hearts The Enduring Call to Love*. In the document they elevated racism to a life issue. Specifically, they wrote: "As Bishops, we unequivocally state that racism is a life issue. Accordingly, we will not cease to speak forcefully against and work toward ending racism." (p.25)

What is racism? A common understanding of racism is when an individual intentionally and consciously does something cruel and/or offensive, or simply does not like another person based on the color


of their skin. Using this definition alone, racism is probably rare, just a few "bad apples".

But the truth is, this definition of racism is highly inadequate and does not reflect the historical and present day realities of racism in our country. In fact, the United States of America is now and has always been a racially structured society with white people at the top, holding most positions of power and decision making, with people of color at the bottom struggling to survive. Racism exists in our societal systems such that in almost every measurable way, people of color fair worse than white people, be it in the criminal justice system, housing, healthcare, wealth, education, jobs, etc. This is called systemic racism. More than a just few bad apples ... the whole apple tree is infected.

"The roots of racism have extended deeply into the soil of our society. Racism can only end if we contend with the policies and institutional barriers that perpetuate and preserve the inequality – economic and social – that we see all around us. With renewed vigor, we call on the members of the Body of Christ to join others in advocating and promoting policies at all levels that will combat racism and its effects in our civic and social institutions." (Open Wide our Hearts, p23)

To learn more and stay informed begin with a trip to the USCCB website <a href="www.usccb.org">www.usccb.org</a>. Follow that with deep prayer and discernment as to how God is calling you to respond during this time of crisis in our country. Also, watch this space for upcoming parish plans to assist you in education, advocacy and action toward dismantling racism in our country. And finally, vow to help in some small way, dry God's tears.

## Where Can a TFS Education Lead Your Child?



It was during Mrs. Moser's 8th-grade science class that Nathan Vaughn discovered his love of science and launched his journey into a discipline that led him to his current role as a research scientist at Los Alamos National Laboratory.

"The hands-on experiments, the large variety of animals in her classroom and Mrs. Moser's passion for science really fostered my interest in the field – even if I got in trouble one time for taking a pet out of the science room," Vaughn jokes. "This positive experience in middle school definitely encouraged me to follow my own passion for science through high school and beyond."

After graduating from TFS in 2007, Vaughn continued his education at Cardinal Gibbons High School. After high school graduation, he earned his bachelor's degree in physics and applied mathematics at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and his Ph.D. in applied and interdisciplinary mathematics at the University of Michigan.

The research he'll be conducting at Los Alamos will be a continuation of his studies at University of Michigan – in the field of computational physics.

"Scientists have discovered equations that describe all aspects of nature, ranging from things like how a water flows over a waterfall, to how chemical reactions occur in your phone battery, to how a star explodes at the end of its life. Many of those equations can't be solved analytically – with pencil and paper – however, they can be solved numerically, with a computer," Vaughn explains. "Still, depending on the physical situation, solving these equations numerically may take months or years even on a supercomputer. As a computational physicist, I work on numerical methods for solving

these types of equations accurately and efficiently, in order to enable us to simulate and investigate the physical world on computers."

His work requires a lot of discipline, and he credits his time at TFS for instilling a sense of responsibility in him from a young age.

"I learned a lot both in and out of the classroom at TFS. Middle school was when we started having much more responsibility; we were taking classes with many different teachers, we had extracurricular activities, and we weren't under a microscope the whole time," Vaughn remembers. "It was our responsibility to keep track of our duties and get things done. This is when I developed time management and other skills that helped me throughout the high school and college years as the level of responsibility continued to increase."

As for current TFS students, Vaughn offers some words of advice.

"Do your best but don't sweat every small detail, and enjoy your time at TFS," Vaughn says. "And if you're interested in a topic, go talk to your teacher about it."

### **Helping Our Young Students Handle Disappointment**

To say that 2020 has brought disappointment is certainly an understatement! I don't think that there is anyone I know who has not had to cancel, change, or rearrange at least one thing due to the COVID health crisis. Because of this, there is a lot of disappointment in the air. Disappointment with having to postpone a long-awaited trip, disappointment with not being able to visit with relatives from another state, and disappointment with having to cancel a birthday celebration with friends at a favorite party place.

Personally, I have had heaping doses of disappointment over the loss of various things these past several months. As an adult, however. I have learned how to deal with the emotions that come when not being able to do what I had hoped or wanted. I have acquired strategies and tools over the years which allow me to manage and cope so that I can move forward. I also try to keep in mind that ultimately disappointment will fade. In addition. I attempt to temper it by remembering the blessings that I do have-good health, my family both near and far, a job I love, and the gift of a supportive faith community.

In no way, shape or form, however, is it always easy for me to shift my emotions away from disappointment and sadness to gratefulness! If I sometimes struggle with it as an adult, how difficult must it be for our young children to manage without the benefit of a mature perspective?

Helping our young students handle disappointment and other big feelings is an important part of the social-emotional growth that often begins at preschool. Teachers and other childhood development experts agree that in order for a child to be the most successful, social-emotional skills are key. Early in a child's life, temper tantrums might be expected when there is disappointment, but these need to eventually be replaced; we are not setting our students up for success unless we give them an alternative strategy.

What other tools are available to help our children manage disappointment? Most early childhood education experts will agree that it's important to keep compassion and care at the forefront of the interaction, particularly if the child is experiencing sadness/disappointment. Listening and acknowledging a child's frustration and disappointment are also key. Is there another solution that will help lessen the disappointment? Giving our children an opportunity to help brainstorm other options is also important. We don't know what they might think of unless they are given the chance. These are just a few ideas to help a child cope with disappointment.

One strategy that I also like to always try to utilize first is remembering that I am not alone. There are those who will support me and help me to move ahead. As Catholics, we have the unique advantage of our faith to assist us as well. Our faith

gives us hope that although we might be experiencing disappointment now, God has a plan for us. Because of our faith in Jesus and the glory of the resurrection, we know that God is always with us through the good, the bad, and the ugly. Small children can take comfort in knowing this about God even without the benefit of an adult faith perspective. This is possible because as Catholic educators, we build this idea into our daily activities. We remind the children of the power of God's love to help us cope. Even more importantly, as adults, we can be a strong model of how to ask God for help when things are not going as we had hoped. Our example as educators, parents, grandparents, and as those who love the little ones in their lives, can be one in which we give thanks for what we do have and what blessings have been given to us. Sometimes, showing our children how to thank God for what they have can be more powerful than any other example.

In our prayers, let us not only humbly ask God for the grace to handle disappointment and difficult situations, but also to remember to always give thanks too. Our children are watching, absorbing, and imitating those around them. Let us be sure to provide the best example of how to be a follower of God!



H ave you ever wondered why so many ancient busts of emperors and gods still exist? In any major museum around the world, you'll see rows of these masterful sculptures. The Vatican Museums have one of the best of these collections.

Thousands of busts and statues of the emperors and gods were produced for civil use in ancient times. Just like the American president's portrait is in every US embassy, so Caesar's sculpted form was all over the Roman Empire. For example, a bust would be placed in the town squares of the outlying territories

to indicate that a border population belonged to the Roman Empire. The sculptures of Roman gods were also set up in public places around town so that a certain religious unity was preserved. Being within the empire obliged citizens to pay tributes and taxes, and it assured them of protection. Once the Caesars declared themselves divine, their statue also required sacrifice and worship.

The image of the Caesar marked what belonged to him: from land, to money, to people, to prayer. If you were under his image, you belonged to him.

We also carry the mark of a divine image that indicates to whom we belong. Each human being is made in the image of God, to be his reflection. We are sculpted and formed to reflect the artist who made us. God gives humans dignity because we are an eternal reflection of God's free, intelligent, artful, and beautiful nature. Our inalienable rights, rooted in our spiritual and rational nature, come from our Creator, as do our duties. No one can take them away.


It is proper to render unto Caesar what is his, but both Caesar and his subjects must render to God what belongs to God. +

## Political Campaigns Leave Christ Out

F aith and politics—are there any two words in the English language that are more fraught with potential to divide?

In the United States in 2016 and even in 2020, we went through a heartbreakingly ugly presidential primary and convention season, only to be thrust into an equally disgusting general-election fight—entire seasons in which the modus operandi seemed to be: "Say whatever you want, whether it's true or not, because all things are justifiable in the pursuit of winning."

When faith intersects with politics, we are faced with very hard choices. No party, no candidate, represents the totality of the Catholic faith. No party holds a moral high ground; the bending of truths and the oversimplification of issues is a near-universal characteristic of political rhetoric, and all party platforms contain positions that are inconsistent with the teachings of Christ.

Candidates often tell us that we stand at a point of no return—that if we don't get the "right" result, our country is lost. And for this reason, we tolerate the behaviors, the shredding of opponents' human dignity, the dishonesty, and the trash talking that stand diametrically opposed to the Ten Commandments. Even worse, we participate in them.

Most of us don't want to own our guilt. We'd rather blame the system. If we take an honest look in the mirror, though, almost all of us are part of the



problem. Too often, the tone of our comments on social media and in our safe zones, among those who think like we do, mirrors the un-Christlike ugliness exhibited in direct mail, TV ads, and speeches. We fail to hold our candidates—even the ones we know personally—accountable for the tenor of the discussion. Then, too, there are the articles and editorials we choose to share. It's easy to hide behind them, to let an author take the blame and refuse the responsibility we incur by spreading his or her influence.

The truth is, there is no one "point of no return." We face crossroads every day, every election season, and in every conversation about social, economic, and governmental affairs. At each one, we make a choice to put our faith in the driver's seat—or to make a particular political party, candidate, or issue our god.

In the next few weeks, we, as individual followers of Christ, must decide whether to condone the false absolutes, the polarization, and the dehumanization that have come to characterize our political process, or to hold ourselves and all our leaders accountable to the standard set by Jesus. We all have a choice to make. What will you choose? +

Almost all of us are part of the problem exemplified by the nastiness of politics. We must be more like Christ.



Lord, I am grateful for the power of your love and grace. Teach me to trust that you care about my human needs and obligations.

## Communities of Calling Initiative: Baptismal Call and Disciples

Siena Institute in mid-January 2020, and we elicited interest program participation from members of the Stewardship Committee and several other ministry groups in the parish. We intended to offer the Called and Gifted program as a large, in-person retreat over the Summer 2020, but in the wake of the pandemic we pivoted nimbly and began imagining ways to deliver the program virtually.

Because an online version of Called and Gifted would be fundamentally different than the in-person retreat, we decided it would be prudent to start with a pilot offering and in August we completed our first pilot of the virtual Called and Gifted program. The pilot program consisted of synchronous gatherings via Zoom, as well as asynchronous learning in between Zoom sessions, and 11 parishioners participated. The Called and Gifted facilitators who were trained in January have been energized and empowered to walk alongside fellow parishioners who are discerning their charisms. Participants in the pilot program have been similarly enthusiastic about continuing their work with facilitators, conducting gifts interviews and experimentation two subsequent phases of Called and Gifted.

The following is a beautiful testimony from one of the pilot participants – Jacob House - regarding the Called and Gifted program and his own experiences:

"Recently, I participated in the Called and Gifted program, which is about discerning one's charisms - special gifts of the Holy Spirit related to one's mission in the Church and society. I was a little skeptical at first. As a psych student and business person, I have taken plenty of questionnaires and tests over the years that have added dozens of ways I can categorize myself. Wait, this is more than a simple test? Multiple workshops and an interview? I knew the program facilitators and trust them implicitly, so I proceeded. I found the workshops

interesting and informative, but also necessary to prepare me for the best part - my interview. Suddenly a lot of different things began falling into place - like cracking the code to a puzzle. Baptismal call --Holy Spirit --Confirmation --Practicing charisms before I had a word for them --Talking through them with a trained facilitator – and hearing what the facilitator for my interview heard. Whether you're a cradle Catholic, a convert, neither, or just curious, I need to make sure you've heard this, plain and simple: At Baptism, you become part of the body of Christ and you are given gifts by the Holy Spirit. At Confirmation, the Holy Spirit strengthens the gifts you've been given, and you have everything you need to go forth and make disciples.

During this past year of work, we were able to build a team of individuals equipped with the necessary language and tools to facilitate calling and discernment efforts on a large scale. Monsignor Clay is jumping right in to understand the purpose of CCI, as well as our history with the initiative, and has proposed opportunities for complementing and grounding the work we've completed thus far through our project activities. Further, he has recommended strategies for integrating CCI related efforts into different facets of the parish, including faith formation and liturgy. Monsignor Clay's appreciation for the desired outcomes of CCI, and his full participation in imagining how to achieve those outcomes, constitute a very promising sign for our congregation.

Often, forces outside our control prompt reevaluation of our callings. In the past year, the Friars' departure and the pandemic challenged us to think differently about how we are called to "be church" in this moment, as well as what kind of church we will be as we begin another chapter under new leadership. Our next steps seek to offer and ensure

that all members of our community have the essential grounding in our Christian faith necessary to situate the process of discerning charisms and empower a moving out in discipleship and mission. We are developing online asynchronous modules that will focus on foundational aspects of contemporary first evangelization, the kerygma or the apostolic proclamation of salvation through Jesus Christ. The online modules will serve as a broad foundation on which targeted programming like the Called and Gifted Program will be built over time and will offer a vision to situate why discerning charisms is important for implementing the final element of the kerygma as well as to introduce our new pastor and his vision for the CCI to people of the parish community. We also hope to bring guest speakers, perhaps Kathleen Cahalan and/or Sherry Weddell, to visit SFA when it is once again safe to do so. We believe highlighting an expert voice is an effective way to elevate our CCI efforts. God gives us the Holy Spirit and we hope that our efforts plant fruitful seeds of understanding that all baptized are called to a life of discipleship and mission – to go out beyond the doors and proclaim the Good News.

St. Francis is profoundly fortunate to have been selected as one of the participating CCI churches. We hope that as we roll this program out to the broader community that our family here will take advantage of learning about and claiming your Baptismal Call. As Jacob House has so eloquently reminded us - we became a part of the body of Christ at Baptism. We look forward to working with our community to bring new understanding and empowerment with regard to our gifts strengthened by the Holy Spirit and together go forth as Disciples!
