

We are moving to the last phase of catch-up for the many things that were postponed or delayed with the onset of COVID-19 in March. On Saturday, October 24, and Saturday, October 31, we will conclude the last major catch-up event by celebrating First Communion Masses with the remaining chil-

dren who were scheduled to celebrate this important moment in their lives back in the spring. It took five liturgies to accomplish this given social distancing, etc., but I'm very happy to see these children reach this milestone in their lives. Please join me in congratulating them!

November 1 (All Saints Day) and November 2 (All Souls Day) are upon us soon, both feasts having an ancient history in the Catholic Church. The first remembers the innumerable uncanonized saints who do not have a day on the liturgical calendar dedicated to them like Sts. Francis and Clare do, some of whom may be your relatives or friends. The second is set aside to pray for all the faithful departed, to remember them by name, and to commend them to the Lord, especially those who may have gone into eternity with sin still on their souls. "As Catholics, we have a tradition of praying for our deceased relatives and friends. It is a way of continuing our relationship with them and assisting them on their journey to heaven." (Catholic Faith Handbook for Youth, 124). Because we retain a relationship with our beloved dead, praying with and for them is one way we stay connected to them until we see them face to face in eternity.

At St. Francis, we will remember our beloved dead throughout the month of November. You are invited to submit the names of family members and friends whom you would like to have remembered in prayer and at Masses. You may also place those names on your All Souls Day envelope. These names will be transcribed into a Book of Remembrance and the envelopes will be placed on the altar in the church. Both will remain in the church until the First Sunday of Advent, November 29. Remembering our beloved dead anytime is a venerable tradition in Catholicism, but November is especially appropriate as our lectionary readings focus on the end of life and the end of time.

Because of COVID-19 some of our traditional All Souls Day practices need to be temporarily suspended. We will restore them once we are able to be back in closer proximity to one another.








# Respect Life: St. Francis Advocating for the Life and Dignity of People in Wake County


A couple weeks ago, 3,168 people representing 42 dues paying religious and non-profit member institutions in Wake County turned out virtually on Zoom and Facebook Live to support the public launch of ONE Wake. We had 151 St. Francis parishioners on the call, including several staff members and our pastor. This was an exciting event where our Catholic values and our call to respect and protect the life and dignity of those most in need were put into action. I want to share more about this effort, what happened at this event, and what are the next steps.

What is ONE Wake? ONE Wake is an interreligious coalition of churches, synagogues, and mosques organizing together to improve conditions in our county for those whose voices are often not heard in places where decisions are made. Over the last four years, this coalition of congregations has been meeting together, learning from each other, doing trainings together, and discerning priorities and strategies.

Why are we involved as a dues-paying member congregation? ONE Wake is an exciting and important way we are protecting the dignity of life of our vulnerable brothers and sisters. As Pope Francis wrote in his new encyclical Fratelli Tutti, we are brothers and sisters, all of us, linked together as the human family. With the story of the Good Samaritan as central to his teaching in this document, Pope Francis challenges us to overcome whatever is blocking us from being the "Good Samaritan" with others. Reminding us that we do not serve ideas but people, people who are vulnerable

and suffering in our midst, Pope Francis names all the ways that our brothers and sisters are threatened in our "throwaway culture," as he calls it. He speaks of many vulnerable populations, from the unborn to the elderly, from the migrant to the imprisoned, from those crippled by lack of jobs and poor wages to those experiencing the effects of the virus of racism and xenophobia. In response to the needs of our brothers and sisters. Pope Francis calls us to renew our Christian call to love, writing, "Solidarity means much more than engaging in sporadic acts of generosity. It means thinking and acting in terms of community...It means combatting the structural causes of poverty, inequality, the lack of work, land and housing, the denial of social and labor rights. It means confronting the destructive effects of the empire of money" (116).

What actually happened on October 13th at ONE Wake's Founding Assembly? At this founding public assembly, ONE Wake wielded its power to win recognition and to generate important initial public commitments from top decision makers in Wake County on issues related to three issues affecting our vulnerable brothers and sisters: affordable housing, living wage jobs, and education. Both John Kane, CEO of Kane Realty, and Raleigh Mayor Mary-Ann Baldwin were on the call and publically committed to work with ONE Wake to discuss specific ways in which Downtown South (a large, proposed development) can benefit, and not harm, all communities, Also, 7 of 11 candidates for the Board of County Commissioners agreed to work with ONE Wake in championing the



As we move through this next month before our election, and what the Church calls "Respect Life Month," our Office of Justice and Peace is continuing to offer a series of reflections that speak our Catholic values as they relate to issues of political and social concern.

Our hope is that these reflections might serve as a helpful way to prayerfully discern what matters to you and make prudent decision reflective of your deepest values as vou fill out the ballot. # Translating the Gospel Message for All

My nieces and nephews are great kids—intelligent and kind—and I'm proud to be their uncle. Still, I regret their lack of participation in the life of the Church. From what other parishioners tell me, this is happening all around, not just in my family. Why are we losing so many young people? Why doesn't the gospel message get through to them?

This issue of the best way to communicate the gospel can be traced back to the apostles. Think about our Church's beginning—the time of Pentecost. Outside the Upper Room, I imagine great festivity as people from many regions and nations gathered in Jerusalem. Inside the Upper Room, the apostles were hiding, burdened with fear and uncertainty. Then suddenly everything changed. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, the apostles overcame their fear and burst into the street. The sight of the apostles, on fire with the Spirit as they spoke about God's marvelous deeds, must have quieted the crowd. Miraculously, everyone was able to understand them despite ethnic differences and linguistic barriers.

From Jerusalem, the apostles spread throughout the world proclaiming the Good News to every nation known to humankind. They succeeded because they presented the Gospel truth in different languages through various channels.

Successful missionary activity has always relied on the translation of the



one and true message into the vernacular and familiar idioms of the people receiving the message. The failures of the seventeenth- and eighteenthcentury mission attempts in China were attributed to the Church's refusal to allow a Chinese Catholic rite that would have included "baptismal" pre-Christian theological language and accommodated ancestor worship, which was very dear to them. On the flip side, the success of the Church's mission in Central Africa has been ascribed to the introduction of a Congolese rite that considers the ethos of Central Africa and allows typical African modes of celebration.

As we preach the gospel in our current, ever-changing reality, we can do one of two things: turn inward and hide in a romanticized understanding of our perceived glorious past or find new ways

to preach the gospel. The first option might prove disastrous as the Church continues to crumble. The second, though not easy, offers hope—and the promise of a Church ever new and true.

During the next twelve months let us listen carefully to the spiritual needs of our people, learn to understand and speak their languages, and use their idioms wisely to spread the Good News. Let us pray for the knowledge and courage to do what needs to be done.

Finally, let us pray for the safe return of loved ones whose journeys have led them away from our Church. +

construction of affordable housing on county owned land. ONE Wake also got a public commitment from NC Attorney General Josh Stein to address predatory lending practices impacting over 200 families who live at a Cary mobile home park and to penalize landlords who illegally evict tenants during the CDC eviction moratorium.

What are the next steps? ONE Wake will continue to hold these decision makers accountable to their public commitments. In addition, ONE Wake members announced a listening campaign to engage 1,000 stakeholders on the state of education in Wake County and work with County Schools Superintendent and School Board in public conversations about the best way to address the needs that will be identified. Finally, ONE Wake members were called to action to launch the final phase of our relational voter turnout campaign to contact 20,000 potential voters. Each of the 3.000+ participants were urged to call five family members and friends to ensure that they have a plan to vote.

Again, this is an exciting and important way that St. Francis is working with others to protect, care, and work for justice for our vulnerable brothers and sisters whose dignity is being threatened in many ways. forgive others in the same way that Jesus forgives us when we make mistakes.

Not only did this whole episode bring a huge smile to my face, but it helped me reflect on all that the children were able to discover in the process.

All teachers, but especially those who work with very young children, are adept at seizing an opportunity and running with it, particularly if it is a naturally occurring consequence in the day. We know that preschoolers learn best through play and hands-on experiences. They need to be allowed to investigate and interact in their everyday environment. In doing so, they are provided with relatable opportunities from which they will draw as they continue to learn and grow. It's also important to recognize the value in learning that is initiated by children themselves.

While there is, of course, value in teacher-directed activities, offering a balance of activities that children generate is just as critical to development. Our teachers know how to seize those moments when children's interest is peaked and encourage further exploration. At preschool, we do have planned lessons and structured

activities based on a curriculum, but we also try very hard not to become too bogged down in our plans so that we miss chances in which the child is able to take the lead in learning.

By capitalizing on these unplanned moments of our children's day, we also allow the opportunity for God's presence to be further discovered in everything around us. In this instance, not only were the children reminded of care for creation, particularly since we just celebrated the feast of St. Francis, but the teachers were able to expand the lesson to include a message about forgiveness.

While it is important to accept forgiveness, it is also critical to know how to offer an apology. It's amazing to see how one opportunity could be turned into teaching so many different lessons!

I thank God every day for moments like these and for the amazing teachers who bring them to life in a multitude of beautiful ways!
