As we draw close to the end of Advent and prepare to celebrate the feast of the Nativity of our Lord, I write to express my grati-

tude to all who have helped us get there in one piece, despite the challenges, after a very tumultuous year. I'm grateful for all the parish employees (i.e., the church, pre-school, TFS, and contracted workers) who have been nothing less than heroic in helping the parish navigate a new way of being parish this year. Their creativity, flexibility, generosity, and optimism are so impressive and humbling. I'm also grateful for all our volunteers who are such an indispensable part of the parish. They reach into all parts of the parish and beyond as an exercise of their baptismal calling and countless thousands have benefitted from their ministry. I'm grateful for those who have financially supported the parish, especially in the midst of a pandemic, so that ministry in all its expressions can continue, particularly to those who have faced and are facing incredible hardships. I'm grateful for all who have been praying for us through this year, especially during the transition from Franciscan to diocesan leadership. I shudder to think what things could have looked like without this spiritual accompaniment. Fr. Jairo and I are grateful to be at St. Francis of Assisi and appreciate the ongoing welcome and support we have received from you. We are especially grateful for your patience with us as we learn your ways and introduce some adjustments to help us serve the Lord, you, and those beyond our parish better.

Given the wear-and-tear of 2020 for our employees, I am closing the parish down to give them a bit of a break between December 24-January 3 except for the liturgies of Christmas (12/24-25), Holy Family (12/26-27), New Year's (12/31-1/1) and Epiphany (1/2-3). Our faculty, staff, and administration at our two schools are enjoying a well-deserved break as well. We will resume our regular rhythms of parish life (i.e., church, pre-school, and TFS) on Monday, January 4.

All households registered in the parish should have received communication from me this past week about our annual Stewardship Appeal (if you didn't please contact the office so we may figure out why you may not have received this request). One of the things I've heard from parishioners is that becoming more intentional in the inclusion of our younger members would be beneficial to both them and the parish. In this year's appeal, I took this to heart and asked households to address how all its members who have received First Eucharist might participate in sharing their time, talent, and/or treasure with the parish in 2021. I was recently asked by a curious parishioner if those with a relationship to the parish who are not Catholic and/or not receiving Holy Communion are welcome to participate. The answer is "YES!" We are happy to have everyone affiliated with the parish in some way who have reached the age of reason to consider how they may share the blessings God has given to them with the parish.

Beginning Monday, January 4, we will adjust the way we set up requests for remembering family, friends, fellow parishioners, and others in both the Prayers of the Faithful and Masses. For the Prayers of the Faithful, we will mention only the names you submit in the petitions that are read aloud at Mass. To maintain our longstanding practice, we will also place those names and those related to them, who are affiliated with St. Francis, on our parish website. The current tradition will continue, just in a different way. In addition, we will also inaugurate a formal Mass Intention process on the same day. Requesting Masses specifically for someone, living or deceased, is a venerable tradition and an exercise of your baptismal priesthood, something you received at your baptism, that calls you to pray and intercede on behalf of others to the Lord. There are many ways to exercise this expression of your baptismal priesthood. but requesting a Mass to be celebrated for someone is a venerable tradition since the Mass is our highest form of prayer and worship. Please see the parish website for how you may request Masses to be celebrated for a particular intention. A link will appear very soon for both types of requests.




Caring Casseroles & Feed the Need:

Thank You for Being a Part of Our Virtual Fair Trade and Alternative Gift Market

The blessed time of waiting and anticipation during Advent is almost over. Christmas is coming and with it a celebration of Christ and new life. Our faith tells us that, just as we receive Christ, we are to become Christ for others. You are that new life. You have brought joy to the world, literally.

For the past ten years or so we have hosted a Fair Trade and Alternative Gift market here at St. Francis. This year we took this market virtual and it was an amazing success! In keeping with our Catholic social teaching, you purchased hundreds of products translating to thousands of dollars in fair wages for producers and artisans while insuring sustainable agricultural practices to protect our earth, equity for all despite class or gender, and absent child labor practices and any form of slavery or servitude. Joy to the world!

Most of our vendors had never had an online presence, but they did it. Our parish had never shopped virtually at our market before, but you did it. And here's the important thing. Your purchases weren't charity they were acts of justice. Joy to the world!

We know how poverty contributes to a mindset of scarcity and worthlessness in those experiencing it and as one of our vendors, Barney Hale of Pala Village points out, the benefits of shopping fair trade can have an impact on this too:

"More revenue is always nice, but what I appreciate is a continued emphasis on keeping fair trade available. Fair trade programs are not just about wages or working conditions. They also create an environment of achievement and promise. I feel very strongly about these more intangible aspects because I have been a first-hand witness. All people appreciate being treated with respect and having their work honored. Pala weavers have had their entire sense of worth lifted."

Some more good news – you will be able to continue shopping at our virtual market throughout the year! We know that all we purchase leaves an environmental footprint and we know and respect our call to protect the earth and all of God's creation. Purchasing Fair Trade products is one way we can do this. So you can purchase beautiful and thoughtful gifts for yourself and those you love while insuring sustainable agricultural practices and standing in solidarity with the poor and marginalized, respecting their right to dignified work and helping them lift themselves out of poverty all year long right here: www.bit.ly/SFA-FTM2020 Joy to the world!

Barney shared a story about Juana whose husband was injured and could no longer work in the fields. Juana used money from her weaving to buy a larger, floor-mounted foot loom. She taught her husband to weave and together they be-

gan making wider fabrics they could sell in markets. Within a year, they earned enough money to buy a second foot loom and make even more wider fabric.

"On my last visit to Pala, Juana wanted to take me to her family's compound. Often an extended family builds three or four small, mud brick structures close to each other and share the living-work space. Juana wanted me to see the "house" she was building for her immediate family. It was about 10 x 20 feet in dimension. had concrete block walls, including an interior dividing wall, and a concrete floor. This was certainly an upgrade over mud bricks and dirt floors. Juana was very proud. Then she whispered, "Now my husband and I can sleep separately from our children." I think [an] important aspect of this observation is that taking a leadership role is not something in the culture of Mayan women."

Your purchases through the Fair Trade & Alternative Gift Market are bringing new life and a new state of mind to Juana and so many others. Thank you!

Joy to the world, the Lord has come! You, who have received Christ, have become Christ for others. Joy to the world!



"A kind gesture can reach a wound that only compassion can heal."



As you have seen me write before, we make a strong effort to instill in our preschoolers, even with our 2-year olds, the importance of helping others. We incorporate the message of God's love for us and how we should share that same love for others. We do this not only because we want our children to start on a path to being a kind and caring person, but also so that they begin to understand that it is a critical part of practicing our faith and good stewardship.

Relatable and hands-on community service projects are interspersed throughout our year to help practice doing good for others. We continue to seek opportunities within our parish as well as within the surrounding community. Last year, one of our preschool parents brought to us the chance to partner with the Helene Foundation in Raleigh. This organization is a program that provides immediate

support to mothers fighting cancer to positively impact their families. They try to offer assistance to the family by attempting to do things that the mother in the family might normally do such as reading bedtime stories or taking a child to the park. Again this year, through the collaborative efforts between our preschool, some of the classes at TFS, and the church, we were able to contribute to the foundation's efforts. The Franciscan School collected storybooks while the Advent tree from the church provided gift cards for such places at Barnes & Noble and Target. Due to COVID-19 restrictions the preschoolers were unable to make hot cocoa kits as they did last year. Instead, our families generously donated packets of hot cocoa while some of our preschoolers put together snowflake ornaments for the families. Extra supplies to make the ornament as a fun activity

for the children in the family were also included in the donation. What a wonderful way to come together as a parish and minister to others!

Thank you for your support of the Advent Giving Tree as your generosity helped make our donation to the Helene Foundation possible! Much appreciation also goes out to everyone who had a hand in the project! As this Advent season comes to a close, let us give thanks for our own families and be mindful of those who are in need.



This Week and Next





An Exhibit of Wonder and Love

rowing up I attended midnight Mass on Christmas with my family. I insisted on arriving early because I didn't want to miss the moment before the beginning of the Mass when the sacristan carried the Baby Jesus into the church and placed him in the manger. He was an elderly man who had worked for the church his entire life. He walked with great difficulty and could barely make it down the steps of the sanctuary. Yet, he held the plaster image of Jesus in his arms with such tenderness and reverence he might as well have been carrying a real baby. He knew this image represented the Savior of the world.

As a teenager, I quickly lost interest in the Baby Jesus. I was too *cool* to fuss about any baby, let alone a plaster one. As a student at Notre Dame, I thought it theologically unsophisticated to pay much attention to Christmas beyond the reality of the Incarnation celebrated on that day. I had little patience for the obsession of people for Christmas trees and Nativity scenes. I wondered if they really understood the meaning of Christmas.

But my outlook on Christmas completely changed when I was given a small Nativity set from Burkina Faso, a country in West Africa. It was carved in local wood by a Christian villager. Although the figures were rather primitive, one could clearly see that the artist had carved the Holy Family in the



image of the people of his village. I loved it so much that this first Nativity set became the start of a large collection of Nativities from all around the world, all of which are in the image of the people who created them.

Each year, I carefully unwrap close to 400 Nativity sets. I do this deliberately, thinking of the people who carved each set in his or her own image. As I gently place the Baby Jesus in the manger, set after set, I also think of the old man in my home church from so many years ago and the woman in our church today who carries the Baby Jesus to the Nativity scene with such love and reverence.

In a simple yet poignant way, these many Nativity sets with their varied

features and skin tones and the way we treat them underline the essence of the Incarnation. The artist and beholder alike know that, though very different from us, Jesus became like all of us. Through Jesus, no matter who we are, we are all able to encounter God in a real and tangible way. The Nativity scenes and the rituals around them symbolize and affirm this wondrous reality.

Nativity scenes help symbolize the reality that, through Jesus, we're able to encounter God in a tangible way.

Indeed, this encounter with God in Jesus Christ is not a mere theological exercise or pietistic drivel. Rather, it's a great reality. We celebrate that he took on our image and became like us so we might take on his image and become like him. +
