I'm grateful for those who have financially supported the parish, especially in the midst of a pandemic, so that ministry in all its expressions can continue, particularly to those who have faced and are facing incredible hardships. I'm grateful for all who have been praying us through this year, especially during the transition from Franciscan to diocesan leadership. I shudder to think what things could have looked like without this spiritual accompaniment. Fr. Jairo and I are grateful to be at St. Francis of Assisi and appreciate the ongoing welcome and support we have received from you. We are especially grateful for your patience with us as we learn your ways and introduce some adjustments to help us serve the Lord, you, and those beyond our parish better.

CHURCH STAFF ON BREAK: Given the wear-and-tear of 2020 for our employees, I am closing the church side of our parish down to give them a bit of a break between now and January 3 except for the liturgies New Year's (12/31-1/1) and Epiphany (1/2-3). The faculty, staff, and administration at our two schools are enjoying a well-deserved break as well. We will resume parish life (i.e., church, pre-school, and TFS) on Monday, January 4. If you have an emergency that requires a priest, please call the office number and press "2" at the first prompt and then "3" at the second prompt.

CALLING ALL STEWARDS: All households registered in the parish should have received communication from me about our annual Stewardship Appeal (if

you didn't please contact the office after the Christmas holidays so we may figure out why you may not have received this request). In this year's appeal, I took this to heart the request to be more inclusive of our children, youth, and young adults and so asked households to address how all its members who have received First Eucharist might participate in sharing their time, talent, and/or treasure with the parish in 2021. I was recently asked by a curious parishioner if those with a relationship to the parish who are not Catholic and/or not receiving Holy Communion are welcome to participate. Absolutely! We are happy to have everyone affiliated with the parish in some way to consider how they may share the blessings God has given to them with the parish and through the parish to the larger community.

REVISED POLICY ON PRAYERS OF THE FAITHFUL AND MASS INTENTIONS: Beginning Monday, January 4, we will adjust the way we set up requests for remembering family, friends, fellow parishioners, and others in both the Prayers of the Faithful and Masses. For the Prayers of the Faithful, we will mention only the names you submit in the petitions that are read aloud at Mass. To maintain our longstanding practice, we will also place those names and those related to them, who are affiliated with St. Francis, on our parish website. The current tradition will continue, just in a different way. In addition, we will also inaugurate a formal Mass Intention process on the same day. Requesting Masses specifically for someone, living or deceased, is a venerable tradition and an exercise of your baptismal priesthood, something you received at your baptism, that calls you to pray and intercede on behalf of others to the Lord. There are many ways to exercise this expression of your baptismal priesthood, but requesting a Mass to be celebrated for someone is a venerable tradition since the Mass is our highest form of prayer and worship. Please see the parish website beginning January 4 for how you may request Masses to be celebrated for a particular intention. A link will appear very soon for both types of requests.

JUSTICE AND PEACE MINISTRIES

We are celebrating the great mystery of when God became flesh as a vulnerable child within an empire of great violence. The witness of Jesus' life pointed to the reality that no matter what the political realities are, all of God's children, made in God's image and likeness, are worthy of respect, love, dignity, and justice. Thus, as followers of Jesus Christ, we are called to continue to bear witness to the dignity of human life at all stages.

Throughout the year, we lift up many varied opportunities for parishioners to bear witness to life, justice, and peace rooted in our Catholic values. We write, call, and meet with policy makers and legislators; we demonstrate, pray, and protest; and we envision and organize together to bring about a world where every life is celebrated, valued, and protected. This work directly confronts a range of issues from racial injustice to protection of the environment, from lack of affordable housing to lack of health insurance, and from the tragedy of abortion to the tragedy of executions of prisoners. Pope Francis continues to invite us to a vision of faith and church that is not exclusively a private affair but is engaged in the public work of loving neighbor, works of mercy, solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and political work for justice and peace.

In January, as a way to call attention to the 1973 Supreme Court decision that made abortion legal in our country. people have been gathering together to demonstrate, pray, protest, and celebrate life from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death, and every moment in between. These gatherings speak to a vision of world where these moments of life are celebrated, valued, and protected by everybody—both in the private sector and in the public sphere. Despite the current COVID-19 pandemic, these gatherings will carry on in modified ways, and we want to invite you to participate in some capacity, whether that is through prayer, celebration of liturgy, or in attending one of the marches.

Mass Intentions and Prayer Requests

As you have seen in Msgr. Clay's column, we are adjusting our processes related to requesting Mass intentions and placing names in the weekend Prayers of the Faithful. Beginning January 4, we will begin accepting a Mass intention for each Mass. Some of the changes will be as follows:

Mass Intentions:

- One person will be able to request Mass intentions for each parish Mass with the exception of the 5:30pm Mass on Sunday, which This Mass will always be pro populo or 'for the people of St. Francis parish' as required by Canon Law.
- A maximum of six (6) intentions per year <u>from any one individual</u> may be scheduled at the parish with no more than two (2) scheduled for a weekend Mass. All other requests will be scheduled for the parish daily Masses.
- A maximum of six (6) Masses per year may be scheduled at the parish for any one intention in consideration to others who wish to request a Mass intention. Additional Masses may be requested; however, these will be reviewed by the pastor for a final decision.
- A Mass intention may be requested for: a deceased loved one,
- a living person who is sick or suffering, a living person who is celebrating a birthday, anniversary or other special moment in their life, in thanksgiving to God (including the Lord Jesus or the Holy Spirit), in thanksgiving for a favor received through the intercession of a Blessed or a Saint, or for a personal prayer intention (so long as the intention does not contradict Church teaching).
- Requests will be honored on a first come, first served basis in the order in which the request is received at the Parish Office.
- A minimum \$10 stipend, as determined by diocesan policy, is to accompany each
 Mass request. Intentions will not be recorded until the stipend is received. Canon
 Law requires that all Mass Intentions be celebrated for the intention as designated
 when accompanied by a stipend.
- Mass requests will be granted as close to the requested date and time as possible.
 If it is not possible to comply with the primary request, the next closest date and time will be scheduled.

Prayers of the Faithful:

- Beginning January 4, 2021, family connections (e.g., mother of Mary Jones, etc.) to our recently deceased parishioners will no longer be read as part of the Prayer of the Faithful petition, only the name(s) of the deceased. However, the names of the immediate family members who are parishioners will be listed with the name of the deceased on our website.
- We will no longer offer cards for Prayer of the Faithful requests. Cards will now only be available when requesting a Mass Intention.
- Prayer requests will be accepted up to 1:00pm on Thursday for the upcoming weekend Masses. We cannot guarantee names will be recorded/logged for requests received after 1:00pm on Thursday for the upcoming weekend liturgies. These requests will be listed the following weekend.



In his painting, Rest on the Flight into Egypt by Federico Flori, the artist captures details of the Holy Family's escape. Although they are refugees in a dramatic, stressful situation, he chooses to show the delightful communion among them. Mary sits comfortably in the center of the family, busily collecting water. Perhaps she will wash the cherries or the toddler's dirty hands. Her face, full of serenity and joy, is lost in thoughts that go beyond the work of the present. She is the model of so many mothers who, in spite of challenging

circumstances, focus their energy on loving their children and creating an oasis of peace.

Saint Joseph stands behind the Madonna and reaches up into the tree to pull off a branch for the child Jesus. His strong arm and hand extend straight down toward the child as they both grasp the wood from opposite ends—one giving and the other receiving. This simple domestic gesture of providing for the son is strongly symbolic of what so many husbands and fathers do on a daily basis. Alongside their wives, they care for their families with hard work.

Jesus is next to Mary and reaches out to Joseph. He receives love from both parents while returning that love with joy and gratitude.

The Holy Family reflects the divine family. One day the heavenly Father will also extend a piece of fruit—this time the bitter passion and the wood of the cross. Although it costs his human nature, Jesus accepts it, thanks in part to the strength he finds in Mary. +

We Can Save Each Other

There is something peculiar about the birth of Jesus, our Savior. God becomes small, a tiny infant-God. Think about it for a moment. Who really needs to be saved?

The kind innkeeper saves Jesus from being born in the street by providing a stall, straw, and a crib. The angels save him from the silence of night and lull him to sleep singing songs of "joy to the world." The animals breathe warmth over the newborn Jesus, saving him from the cold. The star shines brightly overhead, saving Jesus from the darkness. Mary saves him from hunger. The kings come from afar to share their gifts, saving Jesus from the pain of need and poverty. An angel comes to Joseph in a dream, saving the Baby Jesus from jealous Herod's wrath.

Jesus uses small things to make a big point.

Of all of the figures in the story, the only one who is helpless, vulnerable, frail, and in need of saving is Jesus. What's peculiar about the birth of our Lord is that we are given a Savior who needs to be saved! Everyone comes to his rescue, giving him what he needs.

Jesus always uses small things to make a big point—salt, a coin, a mustard seed, yeast, a lamp, wineskins, and a splinter all small and seemingly insignificant



until Jesus wraps them up in a parable and delivers them as the centerpiece of a big message. God becomes small to make a big point. God gives us a Savior who needs to be saved to teach us what salvation means.

I remember standing in line at a corner store in East Harlem waiting to buy milk. A rough-looking teenager came up to me and said, "Pastor, my mother says, 'Never buy milk here. It's always spoiled." I looked and, sure enough, the milk was past the expiration date. The young man saved me from spoiled milk and a return trip. Salvation can mean so many things. The parish food pantry...you saved me! A ride to

the doctor...you saved me! A few dollars when I was short...you're my salvation! We've all been there. I'll bet you've said it to someone who has been there for you in your time of need: "You're my only hope. You're my salvation. You saved me!"

And it's Jesus, tiny and frail in the manger, showing us how we can be salvation for each other. Our Savior is born needing to be saved, and in doing so, teaches us that we can be "salvation" for each other. +
