


We celebrate Catholic Schools Week January 31-February 6. We are blessed to have two schools on our campus, The Franciscan School (K-8) and the St. Francis Pre-School (2-5 year olds). Both are outstanding schools with great leadership and excellent faculty

and staff. A Catholic School education is a big financial investment but so worth it. Our students receive an excellent intellectual formation and learn Catholic values that will last a lifetime, just to name two reasons to consider it. The commitment of our parents is incredible, among the most impressive I have experienced in my 40 years of priesthood. There will be several events within the schools this week. Notably, the fourth grade will lead our weekly School Mass on Wednesday at 10:00am. Please consider joining us virtually at 10:00am via our parish website for this week's Mass, indeed every week at 10:00am on Wednesday when the various grades of the school celebrate the Mass that is then relayed out to the other classes at The Franciscan School in keeping with our COVID-19 protocols.

Fr. Jairo has experienced a disruption to his visa change process. The U.S. Embassy in Bogotá canceled his appointment for January 30 without notifying him, stating, when he contacted them, that the Embassy was closed due to COVID-19. When he left the United States on January 21, the current visa in his passport expired as he was previously approved for a different one that required him to return to Colombia for processing. Senator Tillis' office has made an intervention to the Embassy requesting an emergency appointment be granted to him and we now await the response of the Embassy. Please keep this in your prayers as the Embassy indicated to Fr. Jairo earlier last week that his next window for a regular appointment would be "sometime in April."

We are in the final weeks before our new membership platform, Realm, will go live to all our parishioners. Realm is a church ministry internet tool which connects our entire church as one network. Among its benefits, you may view your giving history (which others cannot see), update your contact information, see any ministries (called Groups) that you are currently in, as well as the names of other members of the Group(s). I encourage you to activate your Realm account when you receive your invitation from us in the near future.

Cardinal Gibbons Affiliation Form 2021-2022

These forms must be completed as a part of the registration process. Once you have filled out the information on the Cardinal Gibbons Affiliation form. please send a copy of this completed form to Toni Hammes in the St. Francis of Assisi stewardship office: toni.hammes@stfrancisraleigh.org. Once Toni has confirmed receipt of the affiliation form with Gibbons, then you will receive an approval email from Deb Royals Mizerk regarding confirmation of your stewardship rate.

Throughout this coming week, we will be working particularly hard to participate in activities which emphasize the spirit of these words. Since CSW is celebrated nationally every year, you can imagine the excitement that is generated about this week! It is a chance for us to celebrate the amazing experience we offer our children while recognizing the richness of our Catholic tradition.

Part of that tradition, as I have written about in previous articles, focuses on carrying out good deeds and serving others in multiple ways. Like The Franciscan School, we also have some special opportunities planned during CSW that will put our faith into action. Due to COVID protocols, we have had to change some of our plans, but this has also then left us open to new experiences. One such one is partnering with the *Wake Up & Read* program which works to make sure that every child has the chance to explore a good book. Early childhood

We will also be using our children's creative imaginations to make and decorate cards for one of our parish ministries. It is the hope that the children's art inspires smiles for many people who especially might need an extra one during these difficult times.

Throughout the week, we will also recognize our oneness with all of God's people by having various themed days.





Event 3 Course Faith & Racial Equity: Exploring Power & Privilege

Begins the week of April 12.

Faith and Racial Equity: Exploring Power and Privilege is an eight week course that will be offered via Zoom on Monday evenings and Tuesday mornings beginning April 12/13. Rooted in faith, prayer and Scripture it awakens groups to the economic systems, public policies, cultural norms, and hidden biases that empower some and oppress others. It introduces a framework for understanding and recognizing racial disparities in power and privilege and helps participants explore how faith should inform their response to learning, as well as discern action steps for working toward racial equity in their own communities.

Faith and Racial Equity is not for the faint of heart. It is designed for participants who are willing to wrestle with hard questions and take an honest look at their own attitudes, assumptions, and choices. However, through spiritual grounding and community-building, participants find support and belonging throughout their journey to personal transformation and social action.

Listening Might Make It So

One of the phrases I heard as a child was 'wishing won't make it so.' It covered everything from getting chores done to getting a good grade on a hard test. And since wishing wouldn't make it so, you were expected to work hard to achieve whatever goal you set for yourself.

Life has a way of throwing us curves that no amount of hard work can fix -that degree that was going to assure a great job – the job that was going to lead to great things – the relationship that would never fade – the strong body that was going to last forever. We all have some unexpected situations we have to deal with – and wishing we didn't have these situations won't make them better, but listening might.

What do I mean by that? When someone is going through a hard time, they need the space and the freedom to process. They need to process what they are feeling, what they will have to give up, what they will have to accept, and what they have to do to move forward. So in this processing phase, you may have to tell the same story several times before you can really grasp what happened. You may have to relive the same emotions several times before you can accept a painful experience. You may need to say it until you realize that it is 'so.'

That's how Stephen Ministers help . They are trained in active listening – that means they listen not just with their ears, but with their eyes and with their hearts. They listen. And the Stephen Minister shares back with the person what was heard, including the unspoken things – the pain, the fear, the hopethat hasn't been named. They ask probing questions to help underlying emotions surface so they can be resolved. And most of all – they keep coming back. One hour each week as long as the care receiver is benefiting from the relationship. Some relationships last a few months and some have lasted a few years.

Stephen Ministry is totally confidential. It's free. And it's available for anyone who wants to feel better about the situation they are in. If you're interested in finding out more about this ministry, give me a call. I'm listening!










Celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation from 4:00 to 4:45pm on Saturdays in the church.

Beautiful Diversity

"...Grant that we, who are nourished by the Body and Blood of your Son and filled with his Holy Spirit, may become one body, one spirit in Christ" (from Eucharistic Prayer III).

The term "relativism" gets a lot of attention in Catholic circles these days. The idea of not drawing a distinct line between right and wrong contradicts everything we believe as Christians. It's a dangerous threat.

But equally dangerous is the opposite: fundamentalism. We are often tempted to view every issue, conflict, and situation in black-and-white, defining right and wrong in circumstances where there is more than one right answer.

The beauty of the Catholic faith is its depth, complexity, and nuance. These characteristics make it possible for a richly diverse collection of humanity to unite under one Creed. But unity doesn't necessarily require strict uniformity. All too often, we try to apply fundamentalist principles to things that are not critical to the faith and, in so doing, create division instead of unity within the body of Christ.

Perhaps the clearest example is what is sometimes referred to as the "liturgy wars." Mostly they seem to swirl around music choices. The organ-and-chant crowd insists that guitars and drums are unfit for Catholic worship. Meanwhile, the guitar-and-drum group dismisses centuries of tradition out of hand.



Neither position acknowledges the fact that the diversity of the Church accepts, and indeed needs, both tradition and enculturation.

If you attend Mass in a place where everybody looks basically like you, it's easy to forget that we are a Church whose members span every race, language, and culture on the planet. Within that rich tapestry springs diversity even more beautiful and complex. Each of us is shaped by our nature and by life experiences too numerous to count. We all have our own job to do in God's plan, for which we are uniquely qualified by virtue of who we are, what we've learned, and what we've experienced.

When we consider all this, it should

be obvious that it's neither necessary nor desirable to try to force the entire body of Christ to walk in the exact same footprints. Yes, there are fundamentals that cannot be compromised. Yes, relativism is a threat we cannot afford to underestimate in our Church and, especially, in our hearts. But so is the opposite extreme. If we truly hope to "become one body, one Spirit in Christ," as the third Eucharistic Prayer says, we have to embrace not only what unites us, but also what makes us unique. +

We must create unity, not division within the body of Christ.
