





I extend my blessings and best wishes to all who celebrate the great feast of Easter today. A year ago, no public celebrations of the Sacred Triduum could occur. This year we can gather with 250 in the church for each Mass but I know thousands will still be unable to join us in person. I am cautiously

optimistic that things will look fairly normal next Easter. Hope springs eternal! I am grateful for the livestream technicians who have worked tirelessly to make it possible for those who cannot join us in person to come as close as possible in our celebrations both today and for the past year.

As more and more are double vaccinated and the number of coronavirus infections diminishes, we will slowly but surely increase the capacity of those who may join us in person for Mass after consultation with our task force of medical experts who have been so important in helping us successfully reopen little by little.

There will be a committee established soon to oversee the reopening of the parish. Stay tuned for more details. Know we will be looking for members of our community to assist us with brainstorming, planning, and implementation.

As we enter the Easter season, we will celebrate initiation sacraments on several occasions. Those baptized as Catholics in infancy but who, for a number of reasons, were never confirmed or received the Holy Eucharist will celebrate these sacraments on the Third Sunday of Easter, the traditional Sunday in which Eucharistic overtones are found in the Gospel. Our young children will celebrate their First Eucharist over five Saturday Masses and a few others will celebrate theirs either at a daily Mass or one of the Sunday Masses. Those baptized in other Christian traditions will be received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church and be confirmed and receive the Holy Eucharist for the first time with us at the feast of Pentecost. We will also resume infant baptisms which were on a brief hiatus during Lent.

We will begin inviting you soon to join a small group for the upcoming To Know, To Believe, To Live video-lecture series that begins in early May. I ask you to give serious consideration to joining a small group that will meet virtually twice a month through September to view the video-lecture as a group and engage in conversation about what is presented concerning the most essential beliefs of our Christian faith. More details will follow soon.



Introducing the Ministry of Spiritual Direction

Have you been curious about what spiritual direction is and how it might help you grow closer to God? During this past year of the pandemic, have you missed celebrating the Sunday Eucharist and the sacraments? Has it all distanced you from God? Perhaps now as things are easing up, you are looking for a way to reconnect and grow deeper in your relationship with God. I hope you will take a few minutes to explore how spiritual direction may help you and gain a better understanding of what it is.

It is said that we encounter the mystery of God primarily in our human experience and yet, so often, we are unaware of the presence of this Divine Mystery. The challenge then is for us to awaken to this mystery of God's presence and action in our daily lives and learn how to respond more freely to it. However, this can be difficult to do. Most of us need a companion who can listen to the inner movements of the Holy Spirit and accompany us on this journey of spiritual awakening. That is the role of a spiritual director. We are there to listen, to pray for and with the directee and hopefully ask questions that will lead to a deeper listening within.

Spiritual direction is an ancient Christian tradition designed to help us encounter God in our everyday life. We don't just encounter God when we are in church or in prayer. God is present in our relationships, in our work and families, in nature, in our senses and intellect. So often though, we are distracted or numb to this reality. Meeting with a spiritual director, in an atmosphere of confidentiality, helps us to open our eyes and become aware of how God is acting in our lives. The spiritual director is not there to fix or solve any problems the directee may be encountering but rather to be a conduit between them and God.

For over a year, a team of trained spiritual directors have been meeting to pray and discern the needs of the parish in regards to spiritual direction. Under the guidance of Msgr. Clay and Kathleen Owens, this new ministry is about to be launched in our parish. Presently, we are meeting with directees via zoom but hope to eventually meet in person at the parish. Easter and Our Migrant Neighbors: Our Journey Together



It was Easter morning – the first Easter - arguably the greatest day in history. But there was no dancing in the streets; it was deathly quiet. Those destined to be called Christians were alone with their thoughts. Many were hiding, filled with confusion, grief, and terror. Some women sensed something miraculous might be afoot, and they tried to tell the others. But nobody, not even those women, knew quite what to think. Even as the picture became a little clearer over days and weeks, they couldn't possibly see what it all meant. Something radical and gracefilled was breaking through. But it was just the beginning. There was so much more to discern, and even more yet to do. Important moments sometimes feel this way.

Easter 2021 feels a bit like that first Easter. We're hopeful and grateful as we hold our breath. This is especially true for those new to our land, striving to make a life among us; for those yearning to escape desperate conditions; and for all who stand in solidarity in with them. There are signs of grace. Eliseo Jimenez, who had been living in sanctuary since October 2017 at Umstead Park United Church of Christ, is now free. There's some hope of meaningful legislation, including a path to citizenship for adults who came to the U.S. years ago as small children. We're again welcoming refugees. Parish ministries continue, among them the Migrant Ministry's outreach to seasonal farm workers, and ONE Wake's advocacy for fair housing agreements at the Las Americas trailer park.

The Spirit stirs, calling us to welcome those looking to make a home, earn a living, feel safe, and contribute to their community. But we worry about a surge of desperate migrants at our southern border, including a heartbreaking number of unaccompanied youth. We're outraged at violence against Asian-Americans. We feel the weight of a pandemic that falls most heavily on those already struggling. And we're frustrated that we continue to fear and blame each other, as if lifting

up one's neighbor brings the rest of us down, as if life were a zero-sum game. So much to discern, so much to do.

Perhaps you feel a call to learn more or do more. If so, consider signing up for a new Realm group called "Immigration Issue Team - Allies" (go to Groups | Find Groups, then search for "immigration"; or email Trevor Thompson at trevor.thompson@stfrancisraleigh. org). We see this group of allies as a community of parishioners who want to connect with those who care about immigration-related challenges and opportunities. We expect to use the group to help us learn (occasional emails pointing to immigration-related news and resources) and serve (invitations to participate in initiatives supporting the local migrant community). We ask nothing of those who sign up. No meetings, no pressure - just an interest in knowing what's happening in the world of immigration. We are all migrants; let's walk this journey together.


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

Fr. Lorenzo Ricci, SJ, placed the painting, *The Resurrection* by Domenico Cresti, in the chapel commemorating the spot outside Rome where Ignatius had a vision confirming his desire to ask the pope to found the Jesuit order. It's significant because Fr. Lorenzo enthroned this painting as a symbolic act just before his order was suppressed throughout the Portuguese and Spanish Empires. It was one of their darkest hours.

We all have dark moments in our histories. It seems death will swallow us; that God has abandoned us, and there is no solution. The darkness in the painting

Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. suggests just that—the world of darkness and despair without the light of Christ. The soldiers sleep, the cold world waits below, and a once-strong trunk is dry and sapped of vigor.

Above, the beautiful Christ figure is surrounded in light, while he hoists the victory standard: the blood-red cross of martyrdom set upon the pure white of resurrection. He, like a new Moses, is leading them into the promised land of eternal life.

These contrasting scenes of darkness and light are the message of the painting and of the resurrection itself. Peter, John, and Mary Magdalene had locked themselves at home, engulfed in darkness, fear, and sadness. The next morning, they arrive to the tomb only to find it open and the body of their beloved Savior gone. Victory was being won even as they slept.

Entrust your ways to the Lord and he will act. God is at work winning your salvation! Do not let hope be vanquished! Hold on. Trust in him. Victory is right around the corner! +

Fifty Days of Easter

On Easter Sunday, anything seems possible. The triumph of life over death and heaven over hell seems to resound throughout a world poised on the cusp of spring.

But it's hard to hold on to the euphoria of resurrection for fifty days. White lilies fade and are discreetly

removed from the altar, the spring rush of baseball and soccer starts. As the planet spins one day to the next, we get caught up in ordinary life until one day that newness of purpose is gone altogether.

Faith is a like a muscle: healthier when exercised. In the years after the resurrection, the Church flourished because Christianity wasn't just something you did on Sundays and holidays. It was something radical—something so powerful, so threatening to the establishment that claiming it could get you fed to wild animals. That kind of commitment changes what you do and think and say every day.



You and I will probably never face execution for our beliefs, but the reality of the resurrection should still impact the way we live—not just on the holy day itself, but throughout the Easter season and beyond. It should illuminate what endeavors are worthwhile and which are not. It should challenge us to temper

our anger and expand our willingness to sacrifice for others. In short, it should challenge us to do something.

Nobody needs a longer to-do list. But living the faith doesn't require commitments of epic proportions. Imagine what could happen if every one of us celebrated the fifty days of Easter by doing one thing each day to grow, demonstrate, or share our faith.

It doesn't have to be earth shattering in importance. It just needs to be real. Set aside five minutes for quiet, contemplative prayer. Count to ten before reacting to that inflammatory tweet. Dig into the mystery of death and resurrection with your children. Read the

Acts of the Apostles and figure out one concrete way you can imitate their fervor in the context of your life. Read a book about the saints. Pick up that fast-food bag blowing around the mall parking lot. Send a donation to a crisis-pregnancy center. Buy a can of coffee and deliver it to a homeless shelter.

Doing one thing every day may not change the world, but it will change us. Our souls and our bodies are made to work in harmony to reflect God's image.

Our actions shape our inner reality. The more we act as Christ would have us act, the more our view of the world reflects his. In short, by doing as God does, we become more like God.

And that can change the world. +
