

CREMATION AND CATHOLICS: Catholics are increasingly choosing to be cremated at the time of death. This has been particularly true since the onset of the current pandemic. In 1997, the Catholic Church in the United States, with the approval of the Vatican, published guidelines to assist parishes and the families of those who are cremated in the proper and reverent treatment of these cremains as is befitting their human dignity.

In our country, there are various practices regarding the treatment of cremains. Some of them are influenced by the secular world, other Christian traditions, or other faiths that do not view the human body in the same way as the Catholic Church does. This has led to some confusion or ignorance about how a Catholic who is cremated should be treated. I thought it would be helpful to provide a few comments from our official text, *The Order of Christian Funerals* (OCF), as guidance and education.

The Order of Christian Funerals says the following: "The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they come. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or a friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires" (OCF§417). This is our official Church teaching on this matter.

When possible and feasible, it is recommended that the cremation take place after the Funeral liturgy at which the body is present (OCF§418). This is because the body is of great importance in the Catholic faith since it served as a temple of the Holy Spirit and was once washed in baptism, anointed with the oil of salvation, and fed with the Bread of Life (OCF§412). Increasingly, the costs associate with funerals and other factors makes this recommendation impractical. Note that this is a recommendation, not a requirement.

We have a large K-12 Formation program at St. Francis of Assisi and serve more than 600 children/youth in our Cross Walk, Cross Train, and Cross Road Sunday programs. Because Mass is the source and summit of our faith, our programs are scheduled following the Sunday Masses to break open treasures of the faith that have just been proclaimed. Because we offer a small group-based faith formation program for K-12th grade, Small Group Leaders are always needed!

Our Sunday programs meet twice a month, September through May, during the traditional academic year. The time commitment for Small Group Leaders over the course of the year is 16 sessions, or approximately 20 hours.

Small Group Leaders


- Lead sessions during the time that their child/youth attend the programs

- Are paired up with at least one other adult volunteer
- Do not create lessons. Lesson plans are emailed the Wednesday prior to each session and all materials are provided
- Guide conversations, facilitate discussions, and invest in the lives of vouth
- Build trusting relationships through prayer, games, hands-on activities, discussion on Catholic teachings, and service projects.
- Lead their small group in an activity with the objective of connecting with the Gospel/Catholic Teaching for the week
- Help keep the youth focused and engaged
- Supervise safe transition to parents

EDUCATION MINISTRIES

"Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6

As we end this year, one thing that is on several families' minds is that Kindergarten is on the very near horizon. Our 4 and 5 year olds celebrated the ending of their preschool journeys last week with small class ceremonies outside in our fountain area. Msgr. Clay offered blessings to all of the students that they may know that God is always walking alongside them no matter what life outside of preschool brings them.

Last week, I wrote about our 4-year old teachers and all that they do to make the year special for their students, most of whom will be headed to Kindergarten in August. Some of their students, however, will remain with us for one more year by attending the Transitional class or 5-year old class. The concept of a transitional class was implemented just a few years ago. It is intended to be an extra year before Kindergarten for those children who might not be guite ready yet. Most of the children who attend this class have birthdays very near the minimum age cut-off date and/or would benefit from an additional year of social-emotional growth. The staff in this room are fantastic at encouraging these social skills while challenging the students with additional practice in their Kindergarten-readiness skills. Like many on our staff, this teacher/assistant each have over two decades of work educating children, the majority of those years being at our preschool. We are so fortunate to have their experience and knowledge to share with our students! Below you will find some reflections from our 5-year old team.

Q: What is one thing that amazes you about the 5's?

A: Their little minds are working all of the time! Their creativity and imaginations are stretched even further! They have the ability to be more detailed in their conversations and play. For example, one day they formed a "rock band" all on their own while outside on the natural play area, Exploration Station. They used sticks, pots/pans, shovels, and other items to have their own musical performance! Several encore presentations occurred over the following days much to everyone's enjoyment.

Q: What makes 5-year olds so fun?

A: They are expanding on their independence in so many ways. Their curiosity knows no limits and they are able to gobble up more abstract concepts. For example, they are often able to tell jokes and can expand on the humor in a story. They are better able to engage in more adult-like conversations with not only their teachers but with their friends as well.

Q: Why do you like teaching the 5's? A: They come to us so little and by the time they leave they are very ready for

their next great adventure in "big kid school". Their ability to empathize and take care of each other is very closely reflective of a biological family. They have a deeper grasp of their emotions and being able to offer sympathy and kindness more purposefully.

Q: How do you see 5-yr olds exemplifying their faith?

A: Watching them learn more complicated prayers as the year progresses and being able to lead their classmates in reciting them is wonderful to see. Their retelling of Bible stories or those related to doing God's work are more detailed and seem to impact them more fully; they often are able to share examples of what they have heard that may have happened outside of school.

We are so blessed to have such an outstanding 5-year old team who not only continues to foster a deeper love of learning, but also a deeper understanding of God and His presence in the world around them. Thank you Ms. Aimee and Ms. Tammy!

We had the opportunity to celebrate our 8th grade on May 26th as they walked our hallways for the last time as students. Here we share some reflections from commencement as to how all of our students benefit from their time at TFS, especially as we close out a difficult school year.

The academic and spiritual foundation built here at TFS is constructed year by vear with the help of parents, teachers. friends, and all the others who have, or will, impact our students in their time at TFS. This past year has been difficult because interactions with those who affect the success of our students has been reduced, and distanced, and masked; while we have continued to provide excellent academics, their academic success is not the only important thing that I hope they take away from TFS this year. What are the things our students will remember? Was it studying for a test, or the score on a project? Probably not. I am sure it was a memory about friends, maybe a funny moment from class, the reinforcement of the tenets of their faith

through their schoolmates, or a time a teacher made them feel important.

The relationships formed and built here are the most memorable part, and the interactions that take place each day are at least as instructive as the academic portion of their education. It is the friendships, the classmates, and the "cohort companions" that have taught the students this year how to interact with others. These experiences have taught all of us how to build and live in community with each other. Our students have experienced, learned, and succeeded as a member of their TFS community this year, and every year, through these relationships and they are what they will use every day of the future. Everyone lives in community, and by learning how to navigate and collaborate as members in that community, they will find how what they learned here will serve them well: because, out in the "real world", we all live in community together each day.

We ask all of our students to take what they have learned as a whole here,

whether academically in the classroom, in the Church and in the study of their Faith, and through the impact they have had on the thousands of people they have helped through service; and continue to make a positive impact in the world. If they work hard, be kind, and focus on what is important to them, they will truly be the hands and feet of God on Earth!

As they leave, we again thank the Class of 2021 for all they have given to TFS, because, as happens every year, we have been changed by their presence here. More importantly, we are, without fail, changed for the better. We continuously say that "we send out good people into the world", and this year's 8th grade class is a shining example of that fact!

Witness for Peace for George Floyd

On Tuesday afternoon, May 25th, over 100 people from St Francis and eight other faith communities stood in peaceful solidarity as witnesses to our faith and racial justice and to commemorate the death of George Floyd. We gathered on the sidewalk in front of Benson United Methodist Church and Temple Beth Or. We were standing in solidarity with our Black sisters and brothers because our faith teaches us about the dignity of all human life. We were speaking out that we value and support Black lives and we will keep striving to advocate for racial equity and the elimination of systemic racism.



"As many of us start to see alimpses of pre-pandemic "normal, " many of our low income neighbors are still dealing with massive rent and utility bills. Pre-pandemic North Carolina eviction rates were nearly double the national rate, due to a high poverty rate and rising housing costs, according to the Legal Aid of North Carolina's annual report. In 2016 Durham County's eviction rate was more than double the national rate. More affordable housing needs to be provided and hopefully many jobs will come back with higher pay rates. Some landlords, especially those with just a few properties, have been suffering also. Here's one such case this past month.

A recent neighbor called our St. Francis SVdP conference for assistance because she lost her job due to covid. Then she found a temporary job that ended before Christmas. She is caring for her grandchildren in a rented trailer. Her unemployment assistance, which was quite small, ended. Three other churches helped with her rent in small amounts, as did our SFA conference. When our visitor delivered the check to the landlord, she confirmed that we were not only helping the neighbor, but also the landlord couple. They lived in a very modest home in great need of repair. They hadn't evicted the grandmother, even though they really needed the income themselves. The good news is that the neighbor is caught up with rent and has more than one job possibility, paying a higher hourly rate than she had been receiving. She will need it to get caught up with other bills and try to restore some spent savings.

Several parishioners have been very generous in sharing some of their stimulus checks with our SVdP conference to supplement our budget and we happily received word this week that we have been granted money from the Friends of the Poor SVdP national fund to use for rental assistance for our neighbors. The beautiful painting, Lament Over the Dead Christ by Giovanni Bellini, shows the great care and reverence with which Joseph, Nicodemus, and Mary Magdalene place the body of Christ in the tomb. Yet it is also a symbol of the delicacy and devotion with which we should receive Jesus, who comes down to us on the altar at Mass.

people as a way to seal a pact with him, thus gaining forgiveness of their sins. As if to say, may I be as this calf or goat if I ever fail to obey and live up to your commands.

In the New Covenant, God sent his own Son to be the sacrificial victim to seal our covenant of love with the Father. Before the blood was sprinkled, we consume his Body and Blood in the Eucharist as Jesus commanded: Do this in memory of me. Take this, all of you, and eat. Take this, all of you, and drink. If goat blood could express a covenant in the Old Testament, how much more powerful to unite us with God is the blood of his only begotten Son! How much more powerful to forgive us and communicate God's overpowering love!

Jesus lays down his life sacramentally again in this Mass. Let us receive his Body and Blood with purity and devotion, aware of the amazing gift and the miracle that happens in our presence. +

With God, Keep It Real

When my husband and I found out we were expecting our first child, a friend wrote us a note. "Your life is forever changed," she said. "You will learn a whole new meaning for prayer. I never prayed so much and so hard as I do now that I have children."

Shew was right, but the way it plays out in my life is quite different from the picture my mind drew when I first read those words. Her comment evoked a mental image of deep breaths, long pauses, and fervent, eyes-closed, kneesto-the-carpet prayers for my children.

That is not how my life looks.

With four children in three schools, volunteer commitments, and working from home, I rarely have time to retreat to a quiet corner and kneel in prayer. Rather, I feel the presence of God as a quiet partner standing by my side, ready to leap in at a moment's notice. On any given day I toss a variety of mental whispers over my shoulder:

- What should I tackle next?
- · Grant me patience!
- What is the "natural" consequence to THAT behavior?
- · Give me the right words.
- · Help me to be bigger than myself.
- · That was amazing, God. Just amazing.



The hallmark of a healthy relationship is authenticity. Our human relationships are not based on one form of communication. Depending on what is going on in our lives, we may interact with our closest friends in person, by phone, or on social media, and each of those encounters has a unique character that enriches us.

The same is true of our relationship with God. I sometimes feel guilty about those prayers I toss over my shoulder. How dare I, a lowly human being, talk to the Creator of the universe out of the corner of my mouth? Shouldn't I carve out more time for traditional, more concentrated forms of prayer? Yet in those encounters, God is with me in a way that is wholly authentic for this season of my life.

Too often we try to put prayer—and God with it—in a box. We think of him as out there somewhere rather than looking for his presence close at hand. God wants us to seek him out in all the circumstances of life—not just when the stars align for concentrated, knees-to-the-carpet time. And if that means prayer takes on an unconventional form, that's OK. As James said in his letter to the tribes of Israel: "Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you" (James 4:8). +
