## Since You Asked

From time to time, I will use this page to respond to a question that has been asked of me and/or a member of our staff by one of you. With the arrival of diocesan priests at St. Francis,

the custom of Mass intentions has shifted is bit. Allow me a few moments to explain what a Mass intention is and how it has shifted with the arrival of Fr. Jairo and me.

First, Mass intentions for the living and the dead are a venerable practice in the Catholic Church. The intention's purpose is to ask for God's blessing and grace upon the person(s) being remembered. Some intentions are for the living. Those celebrating a significant wedding anniversary or who are suffering from a serious illness are lifted up in our greatest prayer, the Mass, requesting God's blessing and grace upon those being remembered. We may also remember our beloved dead with a Mass intention. There are primarily two reasons for this type of intention. The first is that those for whom the Mass is celebrated will be freed from any unresolved consequences of sin they may have taken with them into eternity. The second is to express thanks to God for the life of someone we loved in this world and still love. I recently celebrated the Mass for my father on the 25th anniversary of his death. I offered this Mass in thanksgiving for his life and as an expression of my ongoing love for him.

It is general practice that a Mass intention donation goes directly to a diocesan priest who celebrates that Mass. This is a shift from the general practice when the friars led the parish. There is a reason for this. The friars take a vow of poverty and as such are not responsible for directly paying for many of their expenses. In such cases, the province or the parish covers their expenses when they occur. In the case of Mass intention celebrated by religious priests such as the Franciscans, the donation goes into a general fund or to a province. In some cases, no donation is requested. Diocesan priests do not take a vow of poverty. They manage their own salaries, pay taxes like you do, and, unless covered by a parish by diocesan policy, cover their own expenses. One example is a car. Fr. Jairo and I are responsible for the purchase, insurance, and maintenance of our cars whereas a car was provided and maintained by the parish for the friars at no expense to them.

Because diocesan priests bear more responsibility for their expenses, the Church permits them to receive a donation for a Mass intention to supplement the modest salary they are paid by the parish.

Mass intentions are strictly regulated by Canon Law to avoid abuse. A priest may only receive a stipend for one Mass intention per day. In the Diocese of Raleigh, a minimum stipend is established as \$10 although a person may offer a larger stipend at will. This minimum is meant to give access to everyone to request a Mass intention. Each diocese establishes this minimum based on the median income of the people living there.

In the case where a priest celebrates more than one Mass a day (e.g., on Sunday), he may only receive a stipend for one Mass. The other(s) must be donated to charity. We have set up a special account at St. Francis when this occurs.

## Would you consider becoming a Formation Volunteer?



We have a large K-12 Formation program at St. Francis of Assisi and serve more than 600 children/youth in our Cross Walk, Cross Train, and Cross Road Sunday programs. Because Mass is the source and summit of our faith, our programs are scheduled following the Sunday Masses to break open treasures of the faith that have just been proclaimed. Because we offer a small group-based faith formation program for K-12th grade, Small Group Leaders are always needed!

Our Sunday programs meet twice a month, September through May, during the traditional academic year. The time commitment for Small Group Leaders over the course of the year is 16 sessions, or approximately 20 hours.

### **Small Group Leaders**

- Lead sessions during the time that their child/youth attend the programs
- Love God and want to show others how to walk with Jesus
- Are paired up with at least one other adult volunteer
- Do not create lessons. Lesson plans are emailed the Wednesday prior to each session and all materials are provided
- Guide conversations, facilitate discussions, and invest in the lives of youth
- Build trusting relationships through prayer, games, hands-on activities, discussion on Catholic teachings, and service projects.
- Lead their small group in an activity with the objective of connecting with the Gospel/Catholic Teaching for the week
- Help keep the youth focused and engaged
- Supervise safe transition to parents

# Soaring to New Heights TFS Alumni Finds Success in the Air



The three core values of The Franciscan School - Faith, Academics, and Service - are woven into the daily lives of students, instilling lifelong skills that help set them up for a future of success. After 21 years of operation, TFS has seen the return of this investment by watching alumni make their marks on the world.

For Dylan Spitz, who graduated TFS in 2012 and attended all 9 years, it was the academic excellence, moral compass. and service for others that have helped mold him into the pilot he is today. Spitz also comes from a big family: he's the oldest of 6, all who have attended TFS. In fact, his youngest sibling just graduated in June. For his family, TFS has been an instrumental part of their lives for the last 19 years. Principal Mike Watson said "Dylan set the stage for his sisters and brother. Dylan, as well as his siblings, personified the hard work and widespread involvement in all aspects of life at TFS."

After Spitz graduated from TFS, he attended Leesville Road High School where he signed up for an aerospace class his first semester, not really sure what he was getting into. "At first, I didn't like it. But by the second semester, I was really enjoying it and knew I wanted to make it my career." Spitz moved quickly; by age 16, he started taking flying

lessons, and by the age of 17, he had already obtained his initial private pilot license.

Not long after, Spitz attended Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach, Florida where he received his Bachelor's Degree in Aeronautical Science. He continued to work at the University as a flight instructor to get the air time he needed to fly commercially. And just a few months ago, Spitz began as a First Officer in Training at PSA Airlines where he pilots regional flights around the country. He gets to travel to new cities, sometimes having just enough time to explore. But Spitz said his favorite aspect of the new job is learning: "What I enjoy most about my job is that it's a challenge-learning how to fly different planes; some are smaller, and some are much larger."

During his time at Leesville Road HS and Embry-Riddle, Spitz said he was more than prepared for the rigor of classes he took, which he accredited to the skills he gained at TFS. "TFS prepared me to be a good student, helping me to succeed in high school and while studying to be a pilot," said Spitz. Principal Watson shared that Spitz's "success academically, and now professionally, is not a surprise to those who know him. He is driven and ultimately met his goal of becoming a

pilot early on. We are all proud of his accomplishments and know he will continue to be successful."

But Spitz also believes that TFS prepared him for more. He said the school instilled a moral compass for him, the understanding of moral ethics and work ethics. He also remembers the importance of serving others, like the times they volunteered at homeless shelters, donated food, and participated in service projects. Spitz recalls the family duo of teachers - Mr. and Mrs. Stevens (mother and son) - "who were always putting on service events for the community."

Spitz, like many graduates, says his time at TFS went too fast. "Take advantage of your time at TFS and all the opportunities provided because they will pay off," Spitz said. "And enjoy your time there, it truly goes too fast."

## **The Safe Place**



From time to time, I share my personal experiences on this page. Today, I'm going to open up my experience of having a Stephen Minister of my own in the hopes that you may see how a Stephen Minister could benefit you...especially if you're navigating some choppy water in life. For years, Virginia Siefkes has served as my unofficial Stephen Minister. And she has been worth her weight (and mine!) in gold - helping me vent, acknowledge, and move on from whatever situation was before me. I've expressed anger, frustration, grief, disappointment, hopelessness, you name it. And during those times, I've been through deaths in my family, job difficulties, relationship issues, medical issues, and some other things that will remain confidential.

One situation stands out for me. I was working full time here at St. Francis and trying to take care of my Dad. It was clear that I couldn't do everything that he

needed or I wanted to do to take care of him. After 10 years of taking care of first my mother, then my dad, and mother-inlaw. I was exhausted. This is the kind of exhaustion that robs you of your spunk, spirit, joy, sleep, peace of mind, and patience. At one point, I finely admitted that I wasn't sure how much longer I could continue to even attempt to keep up with everything. It was a turning point for me. Acknowledging that I was not keeping up, that I may not ever be able to keep up, and that maybe I (we) would have to lower our expectations of what life might look like. For a moment, I couldn't breathe. Then I breathed. In and out, And Virginia didn't judge me, her expression didn't change. She acknowledged that what I was trying to do was a lot and that I was human. And she was supportive of me and, to tell the truth, I felt that such a weight had been lifted off my shoulders. And suddenly, I felt that I could pick up my burdens and go forward for another week.

Virginia, and Stephen Ministry helped me find that safe space to acknowledge my fear and my disappointment. That was all I needed to keep going. Finding that space where I would be supported, not judged, made all the difference in how I could look at my situation, my expectations and even myself! I didn't even realize that I had been wasting energy beating myself up for what I didn't do instead of seeing what I did do. Hallelujah! So if you're laboring under a situation that is exhausting you, that is making you feel bad about yourself, that seems never ending, I would encourage you to consider asking for a Stephen Minister. 

In his 1622 painting *The Penitent St. Mary Magdalene*, Giovanni Francesco Barbieri, known as Guercino, portrays Mary Magdalene with shoulders uncovered and disheveled hair. These details remind us of her shameful past without defining her present. Rather, it is her humble, penitent spirit from which her heroic love for Jesus springs. The sinful Mary, who had been forgiven so much, is also one who has loved much.

One angel holds out before her the symbols of the passion to remind Magdalene of the ransom her Beloved paid to set her free from sin. A second

His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd. angel pointing to heaven reminds her that these nails no longer bind him. Or as the angel would tell Mary Magdalene in the garden, "He is not here, for he has been raised" (Matthew 28:6).

Many mistakenly conflate Mary Magdalene with the unknown woman from Luke 7:36–50. The woman offers an act of humility by breaking into the dinner party of Simon and sobbing over the feet of Jesus. She bathes his feet with tears of repentance and dries them with her lovely hair. Despite the confusion, we admire this woman's and Mary's humility. Neither were too proud to repent.

The painting is called *The Penitent*St. Mary Magdalene because Mary looks purposely like a person kneeling in confession. Speaking with head downcast, she admits her failures. And as in confession, the representative of God sits on the other side encouraging her to consider Jesus' passion, love, and mercy. The angel in the center reminds Mary to whom she is really confessing. By pointing to heaven, we are all reminded of the source from whom all forgiveness comes. +

## "Be Not Afraid"

A director of religious education once told me that as grade-school children begin to process the world, they come to their parents and teachers with questions. We need to answer those questions, she said, because the window isn't open all that long. If you don't answer their questions honestly, sometime around the fourth grade they quit asking questions like:

- How can we say "thou shalt not kill" and fight wars and execute prisoners?
- · What does gay mean?
- Why don't so-and-so's parents live together?
- · What is contraception?
- Why are those people fighting with the police?
- Why would someone shoot schoolkids?
- · What does climate change mean?
- Why do those children have flies around their mouths?

For many adults, answering questions like these is terrifying. We are jaded, embittered, and overwhelmed by the scope of the world's problems. When we try to put into words what we believe, it often seems simplistic—a woefully inadequate answer to reality. Trying to explain God and the world to children brings into sharp relief the inadequacy of our own faith and understanding of both.

We are afraid to scar our children's innocence. We are afraid of being labeled intolerant. We are afraid our kids



will demonstrate their knowledge in inappropriate ways or contexts. We are afraid of having to admit to our kids the many ways we have not lived up to what we profess to believe. We are afraid of being seen as frauds. Most of all, we are afraid of screwing up our kids.

And yet despite it all, we have to answer. Children's views of the world are being formed whether we participate in the process or not. We might as well make sure they get the right formation—the one guided by Christ and his Church.

The tough questions will always be tough, but constantly seeking greater wisdom and understanding for ourselves takes away some of the pressure to "get it right" for our kids in one shot. Instead, we can approach difficult topics with our children as coseekers in the way of Christ, returning to subjects in greater depth as their understanding grows... and as ours does the same.

Perhaps then, it won't feel so difficult to trust God to give us the words when we need them and the wisdom to know when to respond, "You don't need to know that yet." Honesty is not easy when the subject matter is difficult. But God whispers to us today the same three words that are woven into the entire narrative of salvation history: "Be not afraid." +


