Dear St. Francis Family,

I enjoy baptisms. The babies are adorable, the small children are often unpredictable in their reaction when the moment of baptism arrives, and the adults are waiting in expectation to experience a sacrament they have spent months preparing to celebrate. They

receive incredible gifts from the Lord in this sacrament. Sometimes these gifts remain somewhat unfamiliar or, at times, unknown to those baptized at an early age.

To provide our teens and adults an opportunity to Know, Believe, and Live the awesome sacrament of baptism, we are launching an eight-session video series describing the deeper meaning of baptism and its implications for teens and adults entitled KBL 2: Baptism, Charisms, & Mission. I invite you to view these twice-monthly modules in October, November, January, and February. Like the KBL 1: Kerygma series that will conclude this month, this overview also provides you with an option to engage with fellow parishioners, new and longstanding, in a small group setting as a way to reconnect with your St. Francis community, something many long for as the pandemic continues.

Engineered to Compete: Alumni Spotlight: Will Brown '11

Another article in the occasional series focusing on how TFS helps our alumni get a solid start on their futures.



For those who have been around collegiate athletes, you may know the discipline, time management, and physical demands it takes to compete at that level. For TFS alumni Will Brown, it was the difficult moments and his strong foundation that helped shape his faith and succeed as both a collegiate athlete and an engineering student.

Brown started at TFS as a kindergartener and stayed through his 8th grade graduation. He then continued on at Cardinal Gibbons High School where he realized his desire to both get a solid education and play football in college. Brown chose to attend North Carolina State University where we had the privilege of walking on the football team and eventually earning a scholarship. Brown was part of the Wolfpack family for five seasons, playing cornerback, nickelback, and safety. He helped support the starting offensive team and often played on special teams during games.

While Brown was growing up, he had an interest in math and science. In searching for career paths that allowed him to use his math and science skills, he recognized an opportunity in engineering. He also spent some time researching African American historical figures in science and math like inventor Granville

T. Woods, which helped play a role in his decision to pursue engineering. As one of the top engineering schools in the country--and growing up cheering on the Wolfpack--Brown saw attending NC State as a natural fit for his passions. But managing the workload of an engineering student and a college football player was at times challenging. Brown learned about accountability, adversity, teamwork, and how leaning on your faith is critically important. He says, "Honestly, I think God wanted to show Himself to me through that experience."

During his nine years at TFS, Brown admits "it was a foundational experience that nurtured me with a lot of people who cared for my well-being." TFS gave him the confidence to believe he had the ability to play sports and be successful. Being new to lacrosse and playing for the middle school team at TFS, he was taught that with discipline and persistence you can achieve your goals. Inside the classroom, teachers like Mr. Mike Watson (at the time a 6th grade science teacher), helped keep Brown accountable. "Whenever we had a guestion, Mr. Watson would tell us to find the answer to it and write our name on the board so everyone would know."

Last Spring, Brown had the chance to

coach cornerbacks for his high school alma mater football team at Cardinal Gibbons. He was grateful for the chance to give back and pour into the lives of those players coming behind him. "They were great kids to coach, and I hope I was able to leave an impact beyond the field for those players," Brown says.

Brown currently works as a process engineer for the optical communications plant in Hickory, N.C. where they develop fiber optic cables. Brown is enjoying his time and already gaining a lot of knowledge. Brown has many fond and fun memories from his time at TFS. But as he reflects back to those years, he leaves current students with this wisdom: "Every day of your life is a chance to be better than you were yesterday. It doesn't matter what the past was like, just focus on what is in front of you."

Remembering 911



"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another." John 13:34

Last weekend, we remembered a solemn time in our nation's history. The events of September 11, 2001 will forever be etched in our minds and hearts. I don't think that the magnitude of the loss and sacrifice has diminised in the 20 years since this tragic day. This past week, I came across a reflective comment online that offered a perspective which really left an impression. The author of the comment acknowledged the horror of the day and how most people could recall exactly where they were when they heard the news. Many also could recall how they felt. As I read on, the author suggested that it was also very important to remember how we felt on September 12, 2001. For most, there was not only a deep sadness over the death and destruction, but also a strong sense of patriotism and urge to come together to help one another. There were countless stories that emerged of bravery, sacrifice, and selflessness. We watched and heard on the news how people rallied to lift each other up mentally, emotionally, and physically. Although there was devasting grief there were also the sparks of hope that we would stand by each other and perservere. On that day and those that followed, so many bore witness to the commandment to love one another. So many became rays of light for their neighbor and offered comfort, care, and compassion. It didn't matter who you

were, where you came from, or what your differences were; it didn't matter the color of your skin, your political beliefs, or what you did for a living. At that time, you were someone just trying to help your neighbor cope and move forward.

At preschool many of our classes, recognized Patriot Day in some way. While our teachers would not and should not go into details about the meaning behind the day, they certainly can use it as an opportunity to reinforce other concepts



and lessons, particularly related to a life following Jesus. I have often written about how beautifully our teachers interweave God's message of love throughout the day. Honoring the spirit of Patriot Day was no exception. Part of that spirit

involves not only being the member of a national family, but also remembering to extend care and kindness to those around you. To show our spirit, pride, and unity, everyone dressed in red, white, and blue. Both of our two year old classes enthusiastically waved tiny flags in a parade. One of our older classes made a patriotic "friendship quilt" and donated it to a local fire department. There was an abundance of red, white, and blue stars & stripes art projects and even some fun songs. It truly was special to see so much excitement!

The sadness of the events of 9/11 will always be part of our country's history. My prayer, however, is that the memory of the following day, the day when everyone united under a common mission of triumphing over tragedy, comforting strangers, and offering acts of unimaginable kindness ultimately becomes more powerful than the grief. I hope and pray that I always remember the example of our preschoolers in being happy to include and care for all in my extended family!

Until recently the earth seems to have been able to hold its own against our worst impulses But, 50 years ago in 1971, Pope Paul VI stated that we were at risk of "provoking a veritable ecological catastrophe."

Certainly, our awareness of our impact on our home has improved. However, 6 years ago, Pope Francis issued Laudato Si', (bit.ly/laudsi) a comprehensive look at the relationship between us and the environment. In Laudato Si' he asks us to acknowledge the "immensity and urgency of the challenge we face."

Now, 6 years later, Pope Francis has issued and even more urgent Laudato Si' Action Platform (bit.ly/laudosf) which asks us to embark on a "7-year journey to total sustainability" in our families, dioceses, schools, universities, hospitals/health care centers, businesses/farms and religious orders.

During this month of the Season of Creation, in the bulletin and on the Care of Creation website (https://www.stfrancisraleigh.org/care for creation/), you will find suggestions for lifestyle changes to help you embark on your own 7-year journey. In addition, you may be seeing changes as we continue to address the parish impact on the environment.

We encourage you to thoroughly examine every aspect of your lifestyle and prayerfully consider ways you can tread more gently on our common home.

Y'all Means EVERYONE: Towards an Ever Wider "We"

"Love the sojourner, therefore, for you were sojourners in the land of Egypt."

(Deut 10:19)


When I was ten, I discovered that folks in Pittsburgh pronounce the word "newspaper" differently than you'll hear in northern New Jersey. In Jersey, the first syllable comes from the back of the throat; in Pittsburgh, it's more nasal.

My family had just relocated from north Jersey to Pittsburgh - our first move. My sister and I adapted quickly, and we unconsciously began to pick up the local accent. One day, in a moment of impatience, my dad fussed at me when I said the word "newspaper" in the Pittsburgh way. I was surprised and confused: until then. I hadn't realized there was a Pittsburgh way. I kept my thoughts to myself, but I felt a bit of misguided indignation. Did he think I was now speaking incorrectly? Was he saying that "we" were normal, and "they" fell a little short?

Of course my reaction was unfair. Don't we all from time to time divide the world into "us" and "them"? And it's not necessarily hostile or judgmental: you'll hear folks say with genuine empathy that "we" are called to serve "them" -- refugees, the homeless, the hungry. It's often hard to see the newcomer or someone in need as one of us. We forget that our own family stories include times when we were the newcomer or in need, or that we might be down the road.

National Migration Week 2021 (Sep 20-26, organized by the U.S. Catholic Bishops) and the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (Sep 26, organized by the Vatican) share a wonderful common theme – "Towards an Ever Wider 'We'". Like you, I'd like to see more "we" and less "they" in the ways we think about and engage with our neighbors.

No, I don't expect any magic fixes. But lately I'm trying to be more conscious of when, how, and why I use the words "they" and "them". Moving forward, I'd like to use those pronouns less often. I'm looking for substitutes: phrases like "those of us" sometimes feel more inclusive. And I think often of the bumper sticker on my car, designed by Durham artist Steven Ray Miller: "Y'all Means EVERYONE" is, after all, just a Carolina way to say "Towards an Ever Wider 'We'".

Get a Share of Fresh Veggies at St. Francis



Are you interested in supporting farmers of color, caring for the Earth, and eating healthier food? If you are, it is time to get ready for the Fall CSA! The CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) is a model of securing fresh produce on a weekly basis from local farmers through a subscription model of payment. The CSA at St. Francis partners with RAFI-USA, an organization dedicated to address root causes of unjust food systems. RAFI is partnering with local farmers of color who sustainably farm and care for their crops without the use of pesticides and herbicides and bringing the farm fresh produce to families in churches who sign up to participate. Currently our church is being served by Soul City Farm in Norlina, NC.

For our fall CSA season, the deadline to sign up is September 21st, and the first week of delivery will be October 5th. If you sign-up, you will receive a box of fresh, delicious produce every Tuesday for 8 weeks. The price of a full share is \$250, a half share is \$125. You would need to come to St. Francis on Tuesday mornings (time to be determined) to pick up your produce. Parishioners who participated in the summer CSA have really enjoyed the produce and the mission of this CSA.



Sister Helen Prejean, author of Dead Man Walking, once wrote, "If we believe that murder is wrong and not admissible in our society, then it has to be wrong for everyone, not just individuals but governments

as well." Dignity and the Death Penalty: Evolution of Catholic Teaching (Alice Hugh Brown, author) is a 2021 publication based on decades of experience and insights from Sister Helen. 



A couple who was moving from homelessness into an apartment called the SVdP helpline.

They have been working with a case worker and needed help with rent due to all the startup costs.

We assisted them with rent, and they were grateful for the help.

Before they moved in, calls and emails came into SVdP. "Do you know someone who can use some kitchen chairs?" "I have a TV - does anyone need one?" "There is a loveseat in great condition looking for a new home."

We also put a note out on a neighborhood message board, "Does anyone have a mattress and box spring?" Soon we received an answer, "Yes!"

On move-in day for this couple, a U-Haul was filled with the furniture, dishes, cookware, towels, rugs for their new apartment.

SVdP does not usually handle furniture, instead referring people to Habitat Restore or Green Chair Project, both great organizations.

But the timing of the calls and this couple's situation aligned.

"Please let everyone know their donations filled our apartment and we have been given the hope we so desperately needed. God bless you all," the couple

wrote after they moved in.

SVdP needs assistance to handle the workload of cases.



And yet he comes down from heaven, bends over our iniquity, and gently takes us into his hands while nursing us back to cleanliness and life.

In a detail of the painting, Peter is on his papal throne while Jesus kneels in front of him. What a role reversal! Peter should be washing Jesus' feet, but no. Even Peter tried to reject this act of service, but Jesus insisted—or else Peter could have no part in his reign.

Peter needed to be washed and purified before serving and sanctifying others. So it is with us. During this Mass, allow your soul to be taken into Jesus' hands. Feel him cleanse you, pouring his warm grace over your wounds. Accept his gentle, loving attention as he caresses, dries, and restores you. Only when you have known his mercy and love can you then be an agent of that love to others. +

Wise Christian Stewardship

"G od gave you a body so you can do good things in the world. And you can't do that if you don't take care of your body." This is a pretty common refrain in my parenting arsenal. It is intended to be an entrylevel lesson on sexuality, but in fact it's a pretty universal concept: We have a responsibility to use what we have been given wisely.

When we hear the words "Christian stewardship," we tend to reduce it to "time, talent, and treasure"—specifically, to our gift to the Church. Yet as important as that is, it's not the whole story.

Christian stewardship means the wise use of everything we have and everything we are. It means care of the earth: picking up litter, not running the car while I check my phone in the parking lot, recycling, reusing plastic bags, turning the thermostat down in the winter and up in the summer, shopping consignment, and using The Freecycle Network, which coordinates a worldwide network of "gifting groups" to divert reusable goods from landfills.

It means care of relationships: turning off the electronics and focusing on each other, playing games together, eating dinners together, and supporting each other's endeavors.

It means being aware of how much I have—home, running water, electricity, and especially my own unique talents and charisms—and embracing the



responsibility to share that wealth with others.

If my charism is a love of children, it might mean offering a stressed-out mother a few hours off. It might even mean taking kids for a whole weekend to allow another couple a weekend to reconnect.

If my charism is physical strength, it might mean helping a neighbor fix a broken step or replace a faucet. It might mean mowing the yard for an elderly or sick acquaintance, or someone overwhelmed by circumstances.

If my charism is cooking, it might mean meals for new mothers or families facing loss, extended illness, or emotional stress. If my charism is joy and the gift of gab, it might mean visiting shut-ins, nursing homes, and retirement centers.

When "time and talent" Sunday comes around, we naturally focus on how to give back to God through the Church. Our parishes can function only if we share our gifts. But the responsibility of Christian stewardship doesn't end there. The Church can grow only if we evangelize—and actions, as the old adage says, speak louder than words.

God gave us our bodies; we honor him by using them to do good things on the earth in his name. +

Giving of our time, talent, and treasure is only part of the story.


