

The Pope Invites You To Collaborate: One of the innovations of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) was the retrieval of an ancient consultation process whereby the Pope receives direct input from a representation of the world's Catholic bishops on a timely topic. The consultation could be on a global or regional topic. The consultation process is called a synod (a Greek word


meaning "to walk together") and there have been 19 of them since the first one in modern times occurred in 1967 at the request of Pope Saint Paul VI. Until this week, those involved with public discussion around a synod's focus have only been bishops. The U.S. has usually sent four bishops as their representatives to these meetings which last for a few weeks in Rome.

Pope Francis has reimagined the synod process and wants to expand the consultation process beyond bishops. Beginning today, we embark on a multi-level global consultation that will culminate in a synod in Rome in October 2023. This consultation will begin in each diocese of the world and is to explicitly involve the laity as well the local clergy and religious.

Bishop Luís is in the final stages of preparatory work for the diocesan phase of this consultation. Once we receive guidance from him, we will provide further catechesis to you on the topic and the process and determine who from the parish will be involved in this consultation and how/when it will take place over the next six months.

This will mark the first time in history that the entire Catholic world, laity, vowed religious, deacons, priests, and bishops, will be invited to provide input on a timely topic the Pope wants to examine. It will undoubtedly be a bit messy as we figure out how to do this on such a grand scale for the first time, but I am very excited that finally the laity will be given an opportunity to voice their thoughts on issues the Pope seeks input on regarding contemporary life in the Church.

Dear Catholics of the Diocese of Raleigh,

Our Holy Father Pope Francis opened in Rome this last Saturday, a two-year process of preparation for the 2023 XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, under the guiding title, "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission." While the term "synod" is not a familiar one to most Catholics, it is rooted in Greek, meaning "to walk with" or "journey together." Throughout our history as Catholics, synods have been convened to walk with one another in the Holy Spirit, to listen and discern how the Church is being called in communion, to respond in faith, and to participate in the work of the Gospel and the mission that Our Lord has entrusted to us as the People of God.

The breadth of this current synodal process will involve a broad consultation and dialogue among the faithful throughout the world and over three phases:

1) in each local Diocese, where discussions and reflections are to be compiled into a summary document by April 2022,

2) followed by the next phase within nations or regions, where the discussions within dioceses in that nation or region may be further compiled into a working document, 3) which will then be submitted for use during discussions in the universal phase of the process, at the Synod itself in Rome in 2023.

For the first phase and in solidarity with other dioceses throughout the world, we will begin our journey in the Diocese of Raleigh next Sunday with prayer together at all Masses.

More details will be following, as we begin to structure further how the synodal process in our Diocese will occur over the next several months. May the Holy Spirit guide us and Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception, patroness of our Diocese, watch over us as we journey together in faith, throughout this process and always.



Righteousness and justice are the foundation of your throne; steadfast love and faithfulness go before you. Psalm 89:14

There are many things about the St. Francis church community that drew me in when I was looking for a parish to call home over 20 years ago. I, like many others, was excited to find a parish in which Catholic social teachings were an important piece of the community's overall identity.

Recently, I was in a meeting with the other directors of our diocesan preschools. We were discussing how one area which the Office of Education for the diocese is encouraging schools to be attentive to is incorporating social teachings across the curriculum. In other words, how can the messages of justice, dignity, peace, and human rights be shared in all classes, not just religion class. The directors and I were all commenting that the majority of what we do in preschool has a heavy concentration of learning focused on the messages of social teaching. Some of the most critical skills addressed in preschool involve treating others with kindness and respect, sharing what we have to help those who have less, and offering care for all that God has created. Because young children learn best

through play and their daily interactions, teachers must interweave these skills throughout all that they do.

Some of the lessons related to offering kindness to all are reiterated when we spotlight a "monthly manner". Each month our entire preschool chooses a manner on which to focus. In highlighting a social-emotional skill, which naturally falls under the umbrella of 'good manners', we are largely encouraging many of the key pieces of Catholic social teaching.

The manner in September which our teachers emphasized was greetings, specifically the importance of acknowledging and building a relationship with those around us. Countless studies have been done which speak to how important it is for teachers to initiate and nurture a connection with their students. Greetings are some of the most basic ways to offer respect to others and indicate to them that they are valued. Greetings help us to form a connection with each other which is integral to understanding and appreciating our similarities and differences.

For October, our teachers are intensifying their teaching of the usage of 'please' and 'thank you'. As you might imagine, young children become quite familiar with these words very early. As teachers, we not only teach the meanings and when to use these words, but we try to continually provide models to our students. When children see our example, they are more likely to copy and practice it. If we are true followers of Christ, then we strive to be good people who respect others enough to make requests kindly and also then be appreciative when someone reciprocates that kindness.

I certainly have many reasons to often say 'thank you'. God blesses me each day with opportunities for which I am thankful. He blesses me not only with my own amazing family, but also with a job that I get to go to each day where I can do what I love, work with people whom I love, and practice my faith. This is a true privilege and gift!

ONE Wake Public Assembly on Property Taxes Tuesday, October 21, 6:30 pm via Zoom

St Francis of Assisi has joined a county-wide effort to involve citizenry in tackling the region's most pressing problems. We've shared our work with this organization called ONE Wake many times in past communications. Please accept the invitation below to join your neighbors at an exciting virtual public assembly this month. We also wanted to provide another introduction to the work of ONE Wake.

ONE Wake - What is it?

ONE Wake is a non-partisan, multi-ethnic, multi-issue group of religious congregations, associations, and non-profits in the Wake County area with aggregate membership totaling in excess of 50,000 households. As a collective and organized body of Wake County citizens, ONE Wake addresses the biggest pressures facing families across the county by focusing on justice for all and the common good.

ONE Wake – Why is St. Francis involved?

As Catholics called to love our neighbor and act justly, and steeped in Catholic Social Teachings, we advocate for the least among us and the dignity for all. ONE Wake is providing one of the most powerful vehicles for our community of faith to do this work, be salt and light for others. We currently have twenty St. Francis parishioners in our ONE Wake Core Team and ninety parishioners active ONE Wake allies.

ONE Wake – What have we done thus far?

Last fall, ONE Wake officially launched with a public assembly with thousands of Wake County citizens in attendance. 150 were St. Francis parishioners! Since then, issues of affordable housing, education, mental health, and jobs have been lifted up as priorities for ONE Wake



member institutions. In addition, ONE Wake has been a community leader in voter education and registration, recognizing the importance of a knowledgeable and commitment citizenry.

ONE Wake – What is this Public Assembly on October 21st?

We are hoping to have 150+ people from St. Francis attending this month's public assembly on property taxes. At this virtual event. ONE Wake members will meet with City Council Members and County Commissioners to hear testimony from homeowners directly impacted by skyrocketing property taxes and at risk of displacement. ONE Wake will then present a proposed solution that would

implement a new property tax assistance program for these vulnerable low-income, long-time homeowners, similar to what Mecklenberg & Durham Counties already provide for their citizens.

Respect Life: Reflection on End-of-Life Issues

October is Respect Life Month, an invitation for all Catholics to be reminded of our call to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, from the beginning of life to its natural end, and at every point in between. We are asked to reflect on the dignity of every person - no matter their vulnerabilities, frailties, suffering, or weaknesses – all are children of God.

This week we focus on end-of-life issues, especially the questions that surround the so-called "death with dignity" movement that advocates for the permissibility to hasten the death of persons who are gravely ill (euthanasia) or to prescribe medicine which will allow someone to end his or her own life (assisted suicide). Standing before a loved one who is experiencing immense suffering, and without a clear path to recovery, we are faced with hard questions about the vulnerability of the human condition and the mystery of suffering and death.

The Vatican released a document in 2020 called "Samaritanus bonus" that seeks to offer guidance for Catholic faithful in the care of persons in the critical and terminal phases of life and states. Lifting up the image of the Good Samaritan who provided compassion, care, charity, and a sense of hope for the one suffering, the Church encourages us to hold onto these eyes of faith, hope, and love in the face of what appears very hopeless and meaningless. This Vatican document also points to the meaningfulness of Jesus' suffering and death on the cross and the glory of the resurrection as a way that Christians might experience hope and meaning in the face of our own suffering and death.

Without any context to see the meaningfulness of suffering and death, the



larger culture seeks to avoid suffering and death at all costs or to control them according to individual will and whim. But the Christian, trusting in the compassionate love of God and holding onto the hope of the resurrection, will not despair in this way. Instead, the Vatican encourages us to have "the gaze of the one who does not pretend to take possession of the reality of life but welcomes it as it is, with its difficulties and sufferings, and, guided by faith, finds in illness the readiness to abandon oneself to the Lord of life who is manifest therein."

The Church, thus, continues to say that "in-cure-able" does not mean "un-care-able." The Church encourages comprehensive and compassionate care that honors the integrity and dignity of the person – body, mind, and soul – and advocates for adequate measures to provide the necessary physical, psychological, social, familial and religious support to the sick and suffering.

The document then goes on to say that even with advanced medical technologies at hand, "We cannot directly choose to take the life of another, even if they request it." Continuing to provide compassionate care is our duty. "Assisted suicide, or euthanasia, therefore, is an in-

trinsically evil act, in every situation or circumstance." This teaching of the Church, therefore, stands in stark contrast with the "death with dignity" movement. To bring about the death of a person to ease his or her suffering is always wrong because it is the deliberate and morally unacceptable killing of a human person.

In 1997 the U.S. Supreme Court upheld two state laws in New York and Washington that absolutely prohibited assisted suicide. However, the Supreme Court did not decide whether a state may permit assisted suicide under the U.S. Constitution. The following ten states have now passed laws allowing assisted suicide: California, Colorado, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Maine, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Vermont, and Washington. In North Carolina, the End of Life Options Act, HB780, was introduced on May 3, 2021, by Representative Pricey Harrison (District 61), with bi-partisan support. Similar bills were introduced in 2015. 2017 and 2019 – all failed to advance. At this point the 2021 bill is not on the legislative calendar.

In light of our call to protect for all human life, St. Francis has created an advocacy subcommittee working to bring awareness to and promotion of the abolition of two specific End-of-Life issues, namely, the Death Penalty and Euthanasia (and Assisted Suicide). October is Respect Life Month, a time to remember our call as Catholic Christians to cherish, defend and protect all of life especially the most vulnerable. In 2018 in the document, Open Wide Our Hearts, the Enduring Call to Love, our US Bishops declared that racism is in fact a life issue.

Racism continues to exist in our communities and our country today. It is what makes us see the "other" with suspicion or to attribute negative characteristics to an entire group of people. This evil manifests itself in our individual thoughts. It also manifests itself in the workings of our society. This we call systemic racism. His kingdom is not of the world, and neither are his priorities: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all" (Mark 10:44).

Jesus is strongly self-confident in his pose, yet sweet and inviting in his facial features. He is a king and a friend. His upper body is set, but his lower body is actively moving forward with his leg

We do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way.

Religious and pagans, men and women, children and the elderly-all were enraptured by his purpose and passion.



Mountaintop Moments

ne of my favorite hymns begins, "Tis good, Lord, to be here!" Text writer Joseph A. Robinson captured what it must have felt like to witness the transfiguration of Jesus. Peter wanted to build a memorial on the site; Luke, in perhaps the first recorded facepalm in history, simply writes, "But he did not know what he was saying" (Luke 9:33).

We're a lot like Peter, really. We catch a glimpse of the glory of God, and it's so overwhelming that we don't know how to process it properly. It doesn't fit into our neat categories: good, bad, happy, sad. All we know, as Robinson wrote, is that we want to "hold the vision bright and make this hill our own."

Mountaintop moments happen when we're pulled out of our ordinary. We encounter them on retreat, at parish missions, and in moments of fundamental transition: birth, death, an earth-shattering diagnosis. God seems closer. Life seems bathed in the glow of new insight. Everything seems so clear. So simple.

Yet we all know the hard part comes later, when it's time to weave new insight into the well-worn routines—even ruts—that comprise our daily existence.

Some days we find ourselves exquisitely aware of God's redeeming love. We understand what that means, and we know just what we must do to reflect that love and redemption out into our small corner of the kingdom.

The next day, the glory that seemed



so all-encompassing gets buried by lack of sleep, cranky kids (or spouses, or students, or bosses!)—even shifting hormones.

Small wonder that we, like the disciples, want to build memorials to the great spiritual highlights of our lives. We hope somehow it will help us hold on to that moment of clarity, a snapshot in time when seeing was believing and discipleship required only that we stand still and be present.

Unfortunately, that's not how it works. Insight might happen on the mountaintops, but growth doesn't. Growth happens when insight encounters resistance. If we enshrine our moments in a sterile place, untouched by

the messiness of the real world, they will grow stale and impotent.

Mountaintop experiences become powerful when they butt up against the murky valleys of life and shine some of that sublime glory upon the comfortable, familiar darkness. That is why the last stanza of Joseph Robinson's hymn always moves me to tears:

'Tis good, Lord, to be here.
Yet we may not remain;
But since thou bidst us
leave the mount,
Come with us to the plain.

+



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
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
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
