NOVEMBER: A MONTH TO REMEMBER OUR BE-LOVED DEAD AT ST. FRANCIS

November 1 (All Saints Day) and November 2 (All Souls Day) are upon us this week, both feasts having an ancient history in the Catholic Church. The first remembers the


innumerable uncanonized saints who do not have a day on the liturgical calendar dedicated to them like Sts. Francis and Clare do, some of whom may be your relatives or friends. The second is set aside to pray for all our beloved dead, to remember them by name, and to commend them to the Lord, especially those who may have gone into eternity with sin still on their souls. "As Catholics, we have a tradition of praying for our deceased relatives and friends. It is a way of continuing our relationship with them and assisting them on their journey to heaven." (Catholic Faith Handbook for Youth, 124). Because we retain a relationship with our beloved dead, praying with and for them is one way we stay connected to them until we see them again face to face in eternity.

At St. Francis, we will remember our beloved dead throughout the month of November. You are invited to submit the names of family members and friends whom you would like to have remembered at Masses. There are two ways you may commemorate those you wish the priests and community to pray for in November. 1) You may place those names on your All Souls Day envelope. They will be transcribed into the Book of Remembrance and the envelopes will be placed on the altar in the church. 2) You may write the names directly into our Book of Remembrance. The book and the envelopes will remain in the church until the First Sunday of Advent, November 28.

We will commemorate all who are at rest in our columbarium on Saturday, November 6, at our annual Memorial Mass at 9:00am in the Memorial Garden. All are welcome. Please dress appropriately for an outdoor Mass according to the weather report.

Remembering our beloved dead anytime is a venerable tradition in Catholicism, but November is especially appropriate as our lectionary readings focus on the end of life and the end of time.



November: A Month of Remembrance

The Book of Remembrance

A Book of Remembrance, with the names of loved ones of blessed memory, will be displayed throughout the month near the sanctuary. Names may be written directly into the book by parishioners, or will be recorded into the book from the names printed on All Souls Day envelopes. In addition, these envelopes will be placed on the altar throughout the month. Prior to November, the Book will be placed in the gathering space to record names.

All Saints Day- Monday November 1 at 9:00am

Since November 1 is a Monday this year, the Solemnity of All Saints this year is not a Holy Day of obligation. We will celebrate Mass at 9 am with music, however the Mass will not be live streamed.

All Souls Day-Tuesday November 2, Masses at 9:00am and 7:00pm

During these liturgies we will lift up all those who have gone before us as we pray that "with the mortality of this life overcome, they may gaze eternally on [God], their Creator and Redeemer" (Collect from November 2 in the Roman Missal).

We will specifically honor all parishioners who have died during the past year with a reading of names.

In addition, all parishioners are encouraged to bring photos (framed, maximum of 5X7) to the parish offices prior to November 1, to be displayed on the altar steps throughout this day and then displayed in the parish gathering space throughout the month of November. Please include your name and contact information on the back of the photos so you may pick them up when the month is completed.

Memorial Garden Mass – Saturday, November 6 at 9:00am

This beautiful memorial Mass is to celebrate the life and faith of all those inurned or memorialized in the St. Francis Memorial Garden as well as those buried in the St Francis portion of the cemetery at Raleigh Memorial Park. All are welcome to attend.

Mass is held outside in the Memorial Garden so please dress accordingly.

Celebrating All Things Hallowed...Franciscan Style

The celebration of Halloween is uniquely American. While there may be some connection to ancient celebrations of All Hallows Eve in parts of England and France, Halloween today is considered a non-religious, or perhaps even anti-religious, event. So, what possible connection could a Catholic elementary school have with something like Halloween? Doesn't the word itself conjure up images of witches, devils, ghosts, and all things that "go bump in the night?" Or worse, isn't it a time for mischief and the strange routine of "trick or treat" extortion?

Well, like most things at The Franciscan School, we teach our students to look at the world through the lens of faith, a faith born of our Catholic Christian tradition. In doing so we challenge our learning community to recognize that if God is part of all things – because without God nothing can exist – then what might we be able to take away from the cultural phenomenon known as Halloween?

Well, first, we treat it not as a holiday of fear. And why? Because again and again in Scripture we are told not to be afraid. And if there is no fear, then all we can do is laugh – laugh at the silliness, laugh at the absurdity, laugh at the foolishness – at anything that "goes bump in the night," because if "Christ is for us, who can be against us?" Teaching our student body to approach the world without fear allows us to cultivate wisdom and prudence in them. We teach our students to respond to the hopes and fears of the world with a sense of striving to support what gives life and to heal what has fallen apart.



Second, we transform "trick or treat" motifs from a "demand for satisfaction or else," into what it truly could be: a cry for care and hospitality. Central to our learning style at The Franciscan School are the principals of Catholic Social Teaching. Halloween, then, becomes another occasion for us to reflection on the many ways we may give of ourselves to those who come to us asking for help, aid, and assistance; even when done with mirth and frivolity.

Third, since Halloween comes on the eve of the Solemnity of All Saints, we connect the two. The two observances are not as contrary and antithetical as might first appear, but rather are the means through which God can work at transforming us and all creation from loss to holiness. What we pretend and yearn for in our imaginations and creativity at Halloween, is revealed in glory and wonder in the lives of the Saints. Our calling lies in the latter, and the laughter and hos-

pitality of Halloween is one remarkable way through which God leads us to it.

This was the way of Saints Francis and Clare, who sought in their lives to find joy in the world where others only saw pain and sorrow. Their hospitality and care for the less fortunate and the needy showed that there is no end to our ability to care for one another. As patrons of The Franciscan School, they offer us insight on how we might accomplish the good work God asks us to do, and in ways that bring joy and hope to the world. Happy Halloween!!




30th Anniversary Mosaic

As we put closure to Respect Life Month in October, we again share our long-standing commitment to proclaim that human life is a precious gift from God; that each person who receives this gift has responsibilities toward God, self and others; and that society, through its laws and social institutions, must protect and nurture human life at every stage of its existence.

St. Francis has always been a parish where any threat to life is of great concern.



In our Office of Justice and Peace, we have Issue Teams that focus on providing formation, action, and advocacy on a

variety of life issues so that we can be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in the world. There are Issue Teams currently focused on the following issues: beginning and end of life issues, immigration, climate change, racism, mental health, peacemaking/nonviolence, education, and affordable housing. In a document called *Living the Gospel of Life: A Challenge to American Catholics*, the US Bishops offered a great vision for our call as Catholics: "The application of Gospel values to real situations is an essential work of the Christian community. Adopting a consistent ethic of life.

the Catholic Church promotes a broad spectrum of issues seeking to protect human life and promote human dignity from the inception of life to its final moment. Opposition to abortion and euthanasia does not excuse indifference to those who suffer from poverty, violence and injustice. Any politics of human life must work to resist the violence of war and the scandal of capital punishment. Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing, and health care. Therefore, Catholics should eagerly involve themselves as advocates for the weak and marginalized in all these areas."

This vision of a consistent ethic of life transcends political affiliations since the Gospel of Life (see Pope St. John Paul II's encyclical, *The Gospel of Life*) by its nature transcends political affiliations. We would love to partner with more parishioners in promoting the Reign of God on earth. We hope more will join us in our ministry.

International Civil Rights Museum Virtual Visit

The Bishops specifically wrote that they will not cease to speak forcefully against and work toward ending racism and they called all of us to do the same.

With this in mind we invite you to join our latest racism study group on a VIRTU-AL tour of the International Civil Rights Museum in Greensboro. This is a gem of a museum located in the building which formerly housed the Woolworth's lunch counter where the four brave Black students from NC A&T first sat down and refused to get up until they were served. Thus began the non-violent protests that eventually integrated lunch counters all over our country. You won't want to miss this!

St. Francis' St. Vincent DePaul Conference Doubles their Outreach to those Vulnerable to Eviction

You may recall that when Monsignor Clay came to St. Francis of Assisi (SFA), the pandemic was in full swing. In his early days, he was gathering input from parishioners on the upcoming priorities for SFA. One of the points mentioned was, how was SFA going to serve the many people affected by the pandemic, and how was SFA going to be a part of the solution for the potential wave of evictions ahead. This year the wave started, and through the ministry of the St. Vincent de Paul Conference (SVdP), we have stepped up!

SVdP is an international Catholic lay organization with a mission to serve the needs of the poor and vulnerable. The SFA conference of SVdP was established in 2016 and provides emergency assistance to individuals in the surrounding area to prevent homelessness, loss of utilities, and unemployment.

SVdP primarily receives funds through the parish by way of a portion of the offertory designated to support outreach and mission to the poor and vulnerable. In this year of Covid, those funds from the "Justice & Peace Tithe" have been needed more than ever. In addition to this financial commitment of the parish, SVdP has received several additional funding

streams that have increased their ability to help others threatened with eviction. A big thank you to the parishioners who forwarded their stimulus checks to SVdP, to those who have made very significant one-time direct donations, and to those who have become regular contributors over this past year!

The SVdP numbers alone are telling. With the end of the eviction moratorium many people are facing evictions or having their power or water turned off, some facing these situations for the first time ever. SVdP has served more than twice the number of families over previous years. Thus, our assistance expenses were well over twice those in previous years. We assisted more families with more money and kept more families in their homes with electricity on and water running. It is very gratifying to call the utility company and tell them SVdP is assisting a family with their water bill and know by the end of the day their water will be turned back on.

This year SVdP developed stronger partnerships and processes with other area ministries. We have been working closely with Our Lady of Lourdes (OLL) SVdP and with First Presbyterian/Edenton St United Methodist on several cases. This


has been effective to facilitate, not only our ministries but also the neighbors needing assistance.

The 21 members of St. Vincent de Paul have done an amazing job, ministering to our neighbors dealing with these financial crises. SVdP usually conducts home visits as part of our ministry. With COVID, we have been conducting most of our visits by phone. Our members have worked with neighbors to sign up for the COVID relief funds, the children's tax credit and utility relief funds. They have connected neighbors to food banks. For some of our neighbors, this is the first time they've needed to use the local food bank. Some of these ministering relationships go on for weeks as a neighbor works on getting the funds they need. This is a very compassionate and caring group, who stepped up and just dealt with the additional workload due to COVID.

Spiritual Direction – Is It for You?

In recent months you may have heard the term "spiritual direction" and wondered what it involves and specifically, what it means. There are various definitions for spiritual direction, but it is best understood as a conversation between two people where the spiritual director, through deep listening, seeks to assist the seeker to grow in their ability to recognize the Holy Spirit's message to them in their daily life. God speaks to us throughout our day so this listening is not just during prayer or at Mass. It is a holy listening to the presence of God in all our relationships of family, friends and work and in the everyday events of our lives. We know that God is always present to us. In the process of spiritual direction, we learn to become more attentive to God's presence and how the Holy Spirt may be moving within us.

The role of the spiritual director is to listen for those movements of God's Spirit in what is being shared as they accompany the seeker on their spiritual journey. They are not counsellors but have been

trained in this particular type of holy listening. In time, they become soul friends because what is shared is sacred.

Typically, a spiritual direction meeting lasts 30 – 60 minutes. Some meet weekly but more likely, you will meet with your spiritual director monthly. How often you choose to meet will be something you will discuss with your spiritual director. There is no set length for how long you and your spiritual director will continue the relationship. It is suggested that you commit to meet with your director for three months. This is typically enough time to discern that the relationship is the right fit.

Here at St. Francis of Assisi Parish, we are fortunate to have a ministry available to us. There is more information on our website (https://www.stfrancisraleigh.org/spiritual-direction/) with instructions on how to contact a spiritual director.

You may also want to sign up for a virtual info meeting on Tuesday, November 9 at 7:30 pm or Thursday, Nov. 11 at 1:00pm.

These sessions are an opportunity to learn more about spiritual direction and meet several of the spiritual directors offering this ministry in our parish. We hope you will "Come and See" what it is all about.

God's Greatest Commandments

Today's first reading recalls the most sacred text in Judaism, the Shema Israel: "Hear [O] Israel." These words are so sacred for Jews, they are prayed in the most important moments of peril or supreme holiness. Jews don't take these words lightly because they express the essence of their religion and relationship to God.

As Catholics, we fully agree with our Jewish brothers and sisters on this matter. Jesus himself answered the question of what was the first, greatest commandment—it was the Shema Israel.

Sunday Readings

Deuteronomy 6:2-6

Hear then, Israel, and be careful to observe [the commandments], that it may go well with you and that you may increase greatly.

Hebrews 7:23-28

He, because he remains forever, has a priesthood that does not pass away.

Mark 12:28b-34

[The scribe said to Jesus,] "'To love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices."

Why is it so important? Because it declares the unity of God: "The LORD is our God, the LORD alone!" (Deuteronomy 6:4). He is one supreme God, not a multitude of divinities as in the Greek and Roman polytheistic religions, or even today in Hinduism and Buddhism.

This belief in one God makes the monotheistic religions of Judaism and Christianity unique. Second, this supreme God deserves our love and obedience. "You shall love the Lord your God...." Our role as creatures called and saved by him is to offer loving obedience.

The Second Commandment flows from the first: If we love God above all, then we need to love our brothers, sisters, and ourselves.

What better example is there of this love for God and neighbor than the love of a mother for her child? Our love for God should be reverent, tender, compassionate, and unique. Only you can give him your kind of love. There should be a constant flow of affection and union between us—no separation between him and us. +

Winning, Losing for Jesus

S ometime after St. Teresa of Calcutta died, it became known that she had suffered for many years from spiritual darkness. From the mainstream media, I remember getting the impression that her holiness was somehow lessened because of it.

It was more than a decade before I read *Come Be My Light*, a book compilation of her private reflections. When I did, I was struck by her observation that often those who exude the most joy and peace are hiding great suffering. She recognized this truth years before she began to experience the darkness that characterized the rest of her life.

That darkness, when it arrived, was bewildering for someone who had long experienced great tenderness in her relationship with Jesus. The only time she sensed his presence was when she was serving the poor and marginalized. Eventually she came to realize that the overwhelming feeling of being unwanted and unloved by God was what allowed her to share the experience of people she served day in and day out—those who felt that same rejection from the entire world.

The darkness, in other words, helped her love Jesus better. And because she accepted it without complaint, offering it as a sacrifice of love, she was able to exude a joy that attracted even people who had rejected faith.



I'm not so sure most of us would have the spiritual stamina to hold on to faith under a similar challenge, let alone see it bear such abundant fruit. In my case, I'm sure of it.

We're conditioned to expect our faith to give comfort in hard times—and often, it does. During times of spiritual dryness, though, the common truisms—"God won't give you anything you can't handle," "It's all part of God's plan," and so on—feel baldly inadequate. In fact, they can cause us to blame ourselves. Surely our spiritual desert is our own fault. If our faith were stronger, it would go away.

I think Mother Teresa's solution is a better one. We all suffer every day, and the causes range from the trifling to the profound: drivers who seem determined to annoy us; the boss or coworker who persecutes us; the discomfort caused by an aging body; the pain of loss, broken relationships, or depression. All too often, we take our sufferings out on others.

What would happen if, instead, we offered those sufferings to God as an act of love? What would happen if we, like Mother Teresa, learned through our sufferings to empty ourselves so completely that the only thing the world saw in us was the joy of God?

If we did that, we just might change the world. +

The fruits of service and joy can shine forth even in great spiritual dryness.



Lord, I am grateful for your love and guidance. Show me how to love you, myself, and my neighbors genuinely and generously.






