

RCIA AT ST. FRANCIS: We are slowly moving to a year-round initiation process for adults and children who are exploring the possible invitation from the Lord to join the Catholic Church. One of the results of this shift is that we will be celebrating RCIA rites from time to time over the course

of an entire year. Last weekend was one of those times. On Saturday, July 10, we celebrated the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens at the 5:30pm Mass with Jesse Woods, an unbaptized adult who had been in the inquiry phase of his faith journey with us since February. This rite made him an auxiliary member of the parish and formally initiates his journey toward baptism, confirmation, and the Holy Eucharist. On Sunday, July 11, we celebrated the Rite of Welcome for five adults who were baptized in other Christian traditions, had been in inquiry since February, and were formally ready to be known through this rite as those seeking full communion with the Catholic Church. They are: Jana Askeland, Mark Burgess, Chuck Fulmer, Carlos Panameño, Jr., and Holden Sewell. This rite took place at the 9:00am Mass. Finally, three adults who had been on their spiritual journey with us since last fall were received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church, Eyram Klu, or celebrated the Sacrament of Confirmation as baptized Catholics, Alexandra (Sasha) Duncan and Charlee Halphen, at the 11:45am Mass.

We will be starting the next inquiry session on Wednesday, September 7. If you know someone who might be interested in exploring the Catholic faith who is 1) currently not a Catholic or 2) was baptized as a Catholic in infancy but did not received further formation in the faith beyond baptism or 3) who is a Catholic adult but is seeking to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation, please ask them to be in contact with me so we can explore their interest. The RCIA is for adults (15 and above) as well as children of catechetical age (7-14). We have a separate track for these children. We currently have eight inquirers who will begin their formation journey in September.






Adult Bible Study Opportunities Letters From Prison, Parts One And Two

by Little Rock Scripture Study (2 books = 9 lessons)

Register Monday, July 25th through Wednesday, September 14th. Space is limited to 20 registrants per session. Two sessions are offered for this 10 session VIRTUAL Bible study. First session is a "get to know you," and orientation to the study.

Wednesday–10:00-11:30AM, from September 21 through November 16, 2022, co-facilitated by Barbara Efird and Cindy Cardello

Study Cost: \$25.00 covers cost of both books. - Books will be available for pick up in the church reception area beginning on September 15th.

Incarcerated numerous times "for the defense of the gospel" (Phil 1:16), Paul wrote several letters from the confines of prison. Letters from Prison, Part One explores the letters of Philippians and Philemon in four sessions, explaining the reason each letter was written and addressing various themes such as joy, unity in Christ, reconciliation, and the close relationship between Paul and his communities. Commentary, study and reflection questions, prayers, and access to online lectures are included.

Letters from Prison, Part Two provides an in-depth investigation of Paul's letters to the Colossians and Ephesians, two letters with a great deal in common. Besides being written from prison, both letters address Gentile communities learning to live faithful Christian lives. Exploring themes such as God's eternal plan, the unity of the church, and the fullness of life in Christ, these letters offer a sweeping and still relevant vision of faith in Christ and the church as his body. Commentary, study and reflection questions, prayers, and access to online lectures are included.

Cross Step (Formerly Play and Pray) Registration is Open!



EDUCATION MINISTRIES

Summer break is always a time for reflection and identifying areas of focus for the new school year. Areas of focus that

I have identified as first and foremost, are the social and emotional needs of our students. Two other areas of focus include professional development for teachers (focusing on math instruction and centered on a growth mindset) and lastly practices that will help us as a school continue to build our Catholic identity while continuing tradition.

This week I would like to share my vision for how we can design instruction and programming to meet the social and emotional needs of our students. As we emerge from the global pandemic that took control of our lives and had many living with a constant fear for more than two years, we are finding that many students are lacking basic social skills. We need to remember to meet not only the individual academic needs of our students, but also, we need to address the individual social and emotional needs of each student. Focusing on this, we still will be looking at not compromising our school's culture and identity. As we return to normal, I am finding that many of our students are in crisis and they

do not have the ability or self-regulating skills to persevere and problem solve when things become uncomfortable for them. Whether it be in the classroom, the playground or athletic fields.

We need to analyze how we as a school and a community of learners will focus on self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, problem solving, relationship skills and responsible decision-making. As a school, I feel that we need to place a greater emphasis and concentration on these areas and truly invest in social emotional learning by perhaps giving of some instructional time and weaving lessons with intention through a variety of classes at each grade level. We will begin incorporating an advisory period one day a week for our 6th-8th grade students. The purpose would be to connect every student with a faculty advisor who serves as his or her trusted adult, mentor, and advocate. In addition to helping students advocate for themselves. the advisor will also meet regularly with their assigned advisees to communicate feedback and offer personal and academic guidance. More importantly, it will be the role of the advisor to help the students connect their daily interactions and experiences to Jesus Christ's life and teachings.

Through a variety of lessons and activities, faculty will empower the students with life enhancing themes that will address developmentally appropriate needs and concerns. Students will be engaged in topics such as Digital Citizenship, Service Learning, Fostering a Respectful Community, Leadership, Self-Advocacy, Growth Mindset, Life Balance and Personal Choice. A complete education encompasses not only academic discipline, but also expanded awareness of self, social interactions and the world.

Mason and Grover wrote, "Covid-19 has forced us to see that being primarily focused on developing students' IQ is not enough and in order to help students to reach their full potential, we must also help them to develop their EQ or emotional intelligence. When we address SEL, we advance emotional Intelligence." Part of our responsibility as educators is to help students become well-rounded adults who can contribute to their family, community and society. Attending to the whole child and meeting the social and emotional needs of students is not new to Catholic education, but it will be a focus moving forward at The Franciscan School. Stay tuned for more information of math instruction while having a growth mindset.

On the occasion that I watch a show on the Hallmark Channel now, it's most likely going to have a Christmas theme. I recently saw a fitness facility advertising a 'Christmas in July' sale almost as if to remind me that I could get a jump start to losing that holiday weight that I am sure to gain in a few months! If you are like me, your initial reaction at seeing these premature reminders that Christmas is "just" around the corner is to roll your eyes. Sometimes, I also usually add a mumbled comment to myself about how the marketing industry seems to rush things every year.

As I prepared for campers to arrive at preschool this week, I began, however, feeling a bit hypocritical because I was reminded that we have a 'Christmas in

July' camp occurring! There were many festive activities taking place for these campers such as wrapping presents, drinking frozen hot chocolate, decorating a tree and hunting for candy caneswhat??? Throughout it all, the enthusiasm and excitement that the children had would have even made the grumpiest person smile!

Although camp this week was largely focused on the more frivolous/commercial side of Christmas, it served as a good reminder as to how/why we celebrate the Advent season with our preschool students in December. As Catholic educators, we remind our preschoolers that Advent is a time to prepare our hearts and minds for the arrival of our Lord, the Savior of the World. Christmas is special to us as faithful followers because it is the birthday of Jesus; we rejoice in God sending us His Son to show us how much He loves us.

The more I started to reflect on this. the more I thought that maybe celebrating Christmas in July is not such a bad idea. When I see those sales, movies on TV, or signs along the road, I do also then think about the true meaning behind Christmas. Because of this, I am given an automatic reminder of the presence of Christ in the world around us. Can't we all use a few more reminders in our daily lives of God's grace and love? This seems especially true when we are faced with challenges, tragedies, and despair in our local and global communities. So it would appear that those signs which might have caused me to roll my eyes, also gave me a nudge to remember that Christ is with me no matter what month or season it is. I think that we all can benefit from remembering this!

Society of St. Vincent de Paul

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus affirms that to be a disciple we must also sit at his feet and listen to him. St. Vincent de Paul taught that it is only in prayer that we can give selfless loving service to those who are poor. This week, please say a special prayer each day for the poor and forgotten in our community.

SVdP at St. Francis of Assisi provides hope, compassion, referrals, and short-term financial help for families. Most of the cases are the working poor—families who can pay their bills until they get an unexpected situation—a funeral, a car needing service, a sickness, or an unexpected increase in living expenses. Any of those situations could make them need help with rent or utilities.

Volunteers, or visitors as they are called,

reach out to those who contact SVdP on the helpline.

Neighbors in need could be like a 54-year-old woman who fell after missing her step on the curb. After recovering from a cracked rib and injured neck, she experienced numbness in her hands and feet and had to go on disability. However, a delay in the disability check put her behind in rent and she was locked out of her apartment for which she paid rent weekly. SVdP stepped in and covered her rent for five weeks until her disability checks began, and she will be able to stay current on her rent as well as catch up on her past expenses.

Another neighbor faced a crisis after the rent in the apartment where she lived for six years abruptly increased by \$300 a

month. The neighbor works full time and is looking at an additional part-time job to pay for the increase. The SVdP societies at St. Francis of Assisi and Our Lady of Lourdes parishes teamed up to help with the rent and buy her time so she can consider her housing options.

"You're always in my corner," is the way one neighbor described the work of the SVdP visitors.

The SVdP Conference at St Francis is helping another parish form a SVdP Conference. The parish has a significant Hispanic population. We need someone who could translate some of our recruiting materials from English to Spanish. All work can be done via phone and email. 
