

Greetings from a very quiet St. Francis campus, in these days in which everything seems different and changed, and each day seems to bring some new announcement, some new prediction, some new rumor. These are unsettling times in which normalcy has given way to uncertainty, and we don't know for how long. The streets are gui-

eter, traffic is less, we don't see as many airplanes from nearby RDU flying overhead. We keep our distance, which seems a cruel twist especially in a time in which we want to gather. In the morning I sit in the empty church to pray, and I imagine what it looks like on a typical Sunday morning, full, lively, preparing to hear the word, preparing to receive communion as the Body of Christ gathered. It's all different now.

As you know, all masses and all events and activities have been cancelled here until we hear further notice from diocesan and government authorities. As you see on our parish website, we are moving, in these strange and different times, to becoming a virtual church until the day comes when we can once again gather in our church sanctuary. We will continue to live-stream our 9:30 mass on Sunday morning. The friars will continue to film a short daily reflection There is a 12 noon "lunch break" with Jim Wahl, and evening prayer at 7pm. Continue to check our website for anything new.

We friars subscribe to a monthly prayer book called "Give Us This Day" which provides the daily mass readings, reflections, and also morning and evening prayer. We have heard that Give Us This Day is offering free access to a digital version of their content: go to www.giveusthisday.org and click on the "digital" button on the upper right side and it should come up. You can see the daily readings and also pray along with the morning and evening prayers. The psalm from morning prayer this morning, psalm 86, reads in part "In the day of distress I will call to you, and surely you will answer me." A line from a psalm, a voice that calls out from a place of distress, confident faith in God. This is where we are right now.

Thank you to our staff which has rallied in unsettled times to help keep our church community as normal as possible in these far from normal times. Perhaps, these "far from normal times" are inviting us into a deeper sense of God's presence in an otherwise frantic and distracted world. As we continue adjusting to this new sort of normal, I will continue to write in this space on different topics. In the words of St. Francis, may the Lord give you peace!

Educational Scholarships for Youth in our Sister Parish Community



We have had a long-term relationship for over 25 years now with a village in the far ends of Guatemala. The community is called Las Margaritas II and is a rural village of about 100 indigenous Mayan families. Our founding Franciscan pastor Fr. David McBriar, OFM and a handful of parishioners established this partnership in conjunction with the organization Sister Parish. Inc. to foster awareness and understanding of the plight of many in Central America for the sake of greater solidarity, justice, and peace in our world. Through shared prayer, mutually supporting each other in a variety of efforts, and exchanging visits, this "sister parish" linkage has allowed us to put ourselves in the reality of others and, thus, experience the profound gift of human solidarity across the many kinds of borders that divide us. Experiencing a real and profound connection of brotherhood and sisterhood is one of the most treasured gifts we can encounter in our lives.

Along the way, our relationship has open up many avenues of mutual work and support. One manifestation of this was the development of

a scholarship program for youth of the village to continue their middle school education. Education in the village is (required) up to 6th grade. There are around 100 students with 4 teachers and limited resources and infrastructure. After 6th grade, school is no longer free, so with limited resources in this village, each family has to navigate the decision around further schooling for their children. Because of this situation, middle school is not something everyone has access to. and high school education is even less common. Our scholarship fund helps underwrite some of the costs for middle school.

Education Ministries



The Franciscan School has Curriculum Grounded in Innovation



Finding he ideal Catholic school for your child

can be an extensive process. Does the coursework provide your child with a faith-filled education while challenging them academically? Will they receive the academic support that they need?

At TFS, in addition to general science courses for grades K-8. curriculum combines the traditional religion course learnings with the application of technology, extracurricular education, and professional academic support. Your child will participate in integrated Information and Technology in their classes to provide opportunities for students to apply what they've learned in our digital world, and ensures awareness of the ethical and societal issues involved with technology. Our middle school students also have the opportunity to participate in the TFS and NC Regional science fairs, STEM electives, and the Student Technology Ambassador and Mentor Program (STAMP). The students testing and other accommodations utilize technology to connect learning points and develop the skills needed to complete their assignments. From K-8th grade, students have access to classroom devices to practice their skills. For instance, students in grades K-2 have iPads; grades 3-4 utilize portable Chromebooks, while students in grades 5-8 receive 1:1 Chromebooks.

In response to growing trends. some schools and districts have opted to restructure their budgets and curriculum to meet the growing demand for academic classes. Un-

fortunately, many elective programs have been cut and are at risk of being pushed out. However, at The Franciscan School, we understand the short and long-term benefits of extracurricular learning. For instance, art, music, and physical education electives improve student attendance, and one study even found that students who took four years of art scored 91 points better on the SAT exams. We strive to provide our students with a holistic learning experience. All students participate in art, music, and physical education classes that improve their motor, spatial, and language skills and encourage teamwork and community involvement.

The Franciscan School is committed to the success of all our students. We know that academic challenges can discourage students from wanting to learn, but we don't let that get in the way. Our Learning Specialists are available for students who have diagnosed learning needs. Your child will receive remediation and curriculum assistance in one-on-one and small group settings, in addition to as needed. Ultimately, we partner with you to create a plan of action that prepares your student for success.

The Franciscan School's curriculum is the foundation on which we've built the last twenty years of educational excellence. Invisibility

There have been times lately when I felt invisible. You know how it feels, right? You walk up to the cashier to check out and they are so busy talking to another co-worker or checking something on their phone, they barely acknowledge your presence. You don't even get the chance to say, "Hello", "Thank You", or maybe another phrase

that wouldn't be appropriate for a church bulletin!

Remember when you used to catch up with your best buds for a couple of hours and find out what everyone is doing, tell them what's happening in your life and the make plans to do it again? Now it seems we have the occasional blast of texts, or emails and then long periods of silence.

Add to that the overload of what passes for news – documenting everything that 'famous' people do, while ignoring stories that might help elevate or illuminate something positive. Social media apps that let you see what others are doing, but doesn't offer the same satisfaction as having a good chat with someone who gives you a chance to share what's going on with you.

This constant overload of what's going on around you and the narrowing of ways for you to be heard can leave you feeling overlooked, overwhelmed, insignificant and invisible. If you feel this often enough, you could start to express anger at inappropriate times, begin to feel anxious and could suffer some mild depression. So what's the answer?

Being heard is a good first step to getting back on track. Stephen Ministers are available here at St. Francis. This isn't therapy, it's a trained lay person who is skilled in listening, hearing, and even asking questions to help you process your feelings. They only know what you tell them and they are only focused on you. They will meet with you for an hour each week to help you until get back on track and find your way. We're here for you as long as you need us. And we've been offering Stephen Ministry here at St. Francis for 26 years!

To Live By Faith

ur Lenten practices are transforming our hearts to receive the love of Jesus in his passion, death, and resurrection. Today's Gospel revolves around this theme of learning to live by faith. The apostles take for granted that the man's blindness is due to someone's sin. The Pharisees call the man a sinner, born in sin. In their self-righteousness they judge both the blind man and Jesus.

Jesus sees and judges differently. He asserts that the man's blindness was not due to a sin of his own or that of his parents and restores his sight.

Sunday Readings

1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a

God does not see as a mortal, who sees the appearance. The LORD looks into the heart.

Ephesians 5:8-14

Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness; rather expose them.

John 9:1-41 or John 9:1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38

Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind." He challenges the wise, educated, and insightful Pharisees by saying, "If you were blind, you would have no sin; but now you are saying, 'We see,' so your sin remains" (John 9:41).

While they can see physically, they cannot see the simple truth that Jesus is the Son of God and has the authority to heal, even on the Sabbath. They are so blinded by their "fidelity to God"—which is really fidelity to their distorted interpretation of the traditions and regulations God gave them—that they cannot see his spirit of mercy. They fail to see with eyes of faith.

Being merciful like Jesus doesn't mean merely condemning blind legalism, it means showing God's love to those in need. First we need to see as God sees. Then we need to love others and to enlighten them with the truth. Jesus heals one man's blindness in the hope of opening the minds and hearts of the Pharisees—and us today. +

While the Pharisees can see physically, they cannot see the simple truth that Jesus is the Son of God.

Ways the Gospels Make Us Uncomfortable

It may be a shift to read the Gospels and feel discomfort. While the words and actions of Jesus enlighten, they're no escape hatch. Conflict, tension, and frustration still plague believers.

But we read the Gospels for one purpose:

to know Jesus better—not for warm fuzzies, easy answers, or reinforcement of prejudices. Nor will we always encounter "Jesus, meek and mild."

He who threatened the cozy assumptions of his contemporaries may have the same effect on us. If we rely on the wrong supports, like wealth (Luke 6:20, 24), prestige (Matthew 23:1–12), or religious rituals (Mark 2:27–28), he'll challenge us, too.

Jesus questioned many of the customs of his time—such as the subservient role of women and the authority of the Pharisees. "It is hard to believe [Jesus] was simply an early flower child who traipsed through the sunlit fields talking about lilies and love!" Nathan Mitchell writes in *Real Presence: The Work of Eucharist.* "Who would seek to arrest and execute such a sap?"

The Perils of Storytelling

We may be uncomfortable with the Gospels' storytelling if we want just the



facts. We might prefer a precise blueprint or spreadsheet to rambling, inconsistent stories. But if we compare the Bible to our own complex, difficult life stories, we grow more comfortable with its mixed genres. We find links where the larger story of God intersects with our personal lives.

So we reflect not only

on Jesus' and the Hebrews' experience in the desert, but also on our own desert times. Wandering in the wilderness brings valuable insights we don't learn in secure kitchens.

As much as we enjoy the intriguing connections, storytelling has its shortcomings. It's unscientific, subject to interpretation, and sometimes wildly inaccurate. Two people who attended the same party might tell radically different accounts.

So, too, each Gospel writer has a different emphasis. Even within the Gospel of John, there are inconsistencies: "Jesus was deeply *troubled*" (13:21), but in the next chapter Jesus says, "Do not let your hearts be *troubled*" (14:1).

Those who enjoy stories listen beneath the words. Their primary interest is the meaning stories give our experiences. We don't read the Gospels primarily for scientific accuracy or historical fact but to follow Jesus better.

We read through the lens of a human

author who will sometimes shade, condense, or exaggerate. Sometimes we may also need to read biblical interpretation, but most important is our response. There's an old saying: the Gospel gives the chapter headings; we write the texts in our lives.

Too Good to Be True?

The Gospels have been misused to incite guilt. Some people may need that stern correction to luxuriating while others starve. But many hard-working people are simply trying to survive, raise families, and do their jobs while being as generous as possible with their time and treasure. They certainly don't need another guilt trip!

What we may find harder than guilt is the Gospels' insistence on how splendid we are. Jesus walked among the diseased, smelly, and sweaty, and assured them that even in poverty, mourning, or persecution, they were blessed. Mired in our own problems, do we struggle with *good* news?

Admittedly, the central message is hard to absorb. We, limited and flawed, are made in his divine image. Throughout the Gospels, the message recurs: You are not a slave. You are a friend and adopted child with an eternal inheritance—not condemned to futility or the finality of death. +
